ORDERS AN INQUIRY.

Secretary Norton Begins an Investigation of the Rise in Meat.

IS AFTER THE BEEF TRUST. Will Bring to Light Whether the Increase Is Due to a Scarcity of Cattle or to an Attempt of Feckers to Control the Market.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Secretary of Agriculture Morton today began an inquiry into the recent increase in the price of meats for the purpose of ascertaining if any combination in violation of law exists for the purpose of putting up prices.

Dr. Salmon, chief of the bureau of animal industry, furnished at your earliest convenience a statement of the stock yards in Omaha, in Kansas City, in East St. Louis and in Chicago during the months of January, February and March for the years 1894 and 1895.

It is important just at this time to ascertain as nearly as may be from those sources what falling off there is in the cattle supply of the United States as compared with previous years.

In January, 1895, cattle sold for \$5.70, in February, the same year, for \$5.65, and in March of the same year, for \$5.77 1/2 per 100 weight at the Kansas City stock yards.

And in 1894 they sold in January at \$5.20, in February at \$4.80, and in March at \$4.70 per 100 pounds, while in 1893 they sold in January at \$5.60, in February at \$5.55, in March at \$5.70, and in January, 1894, they sold at \$5.25, in February at \$4.80, and in March at \$4.50.

I wish now to ascertain the prices paid at Kansas City and in Chicago during January, February and March of 1895, and also the number of cattle received at these points during that time.

The largest cattle receipts at Chicago in any one day occurred, I believe, April 25, 1892, when 32,677 head were received, and the largest cattle receipts at Chicago in a single week were 95,538 head, received during the seven days ending September 19, 1891.

The largest receipts of cattle for a single month at Chicago were in September, 1892, when 385,466 head were received. Be kind enough to instruct the agents of the bureau of animal industry of the United States, department of agriculture, wherever they may be stationed, to collect and send in as rapidly as possible all reliable data in their command which may tend to truthfully show what diminution, if any, there is in the cattle supply of the United States for the year 1895 as compared with previous years.

Also instruct the agents of the bureau of animal industry to make a thorough inquiry as to the reasons for the increase in the price of beef products, while it is putting down per capita price of cattle.

GREAT BRITAIN'S REAL OBJECT. Senator Morgan Says It Is to Secure Control of Venezuelan Gold Fields.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Senator Morgan, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, was asked how he regarded the situation in Venezuela, and replied by saying: "I have no doubt that Great Britain's ultimate purpose is to press her frontier sufficiently far into the interior to encompass the rich gold fields of that section, though she will, of course, not disclose this purpose in the immediate future, but will rather confine her demands to the territory at the mouth of the Orinoco river."

"Do I think the United States should permit this aggression?" he asked, repeating a question. "I do not, I think the direct question should be put to Great Britain by our diplomats as to whether she proposes either by purchase or conquest to extend her domain beyond her present claims. In case of a negative reply I should advise that the United States should not interfere with the settlement of existing disputes, but I do not believe that England could be brought to this definite promise not to press her boundaries further in that section because of the rich gold mines known to exist there. I am convinced, as I believe most men are, that it is most probable that instead of making definite reply to the suppositions question, England would evade it. In that event I think we should invoke the Monroe doctrine forthwith."

Republic of Cuba. WASHINGTON, April 11.—It is stated that the Cuban revolutionists will today formally announce their independence of the island and establish a republic, will proclaim a constitution, name their officers and ask the recognition first of the United States and then other nations.

Leroy Dies in Prison. DENSON, Tex., April 11.—Dick Edwards, alias Billy Leroy, convicted of the murder of Mrs. Hattie Evans, committed here on the night of May 17, 1892, and sentenced to life imprisonment, is dead in Huntsville prison.

TRAIN ROBBER PERRY ESCAPES.

Four inmates of the New York Asylum For Insane Criminals at Large.

POWERSVILLE, April 11.—Four inmates of the state asylum for insane criminals at Mattawan, including Oliver Curtis Perry of Syracuse, train robber, made their escape from the institution last night and are still at large.

A fifth, who participated in the break for liberty, was retaken. Those who made the attempt with Perry are Patrick McGuire, a very dangerous man who once before broke out of the asylum; Michael O'Donnell and Frank Davis of New York City, and John Quigley of Astoria.

Night Watchman Carmody was making his rounds at 11 o'clock, and had passed from the main building into the isolation annex, where the more dangerous of the prisoners are kept, when he was attacked by the five men, overpowered and deprived of his keys before he could make an outcry.

Then the convicts fled toward the chapel. As they ran Keeper Carmody raised an alarm which quickly brought out Superintendent Atchison and the guards. Perry and his companions, however, made their way to the roof through the scuttle. Then Perry slid down the roof to the eaves, from which he dropped to the ground, the fall being about 25 feet.

As the others were following his example they were discovered, and one shot was fired at them. Three of the prisoners followed Perry's lead and escaped. The fifth was too late and gave himself up.

RETORED BY HOLCOMB. Governor Disapproves the Ricketts Marriage Bill.

LINCOLN, April 11.—Governor Holcomb returned to the secretary of state the Omaha charter without his approval. The governor also vetoed house bill 246, to authorize the formation of fire, lightning and cyclone mutual insurance companies, and Ricketts' bill, house 330, legalizing marriages between the white and colored races in the state, and repealing the present law against miscegenation.

In his special message accompanying the veto of the insurance bill, the governor says that in the bill sufficient safeguards are not provided to protect the interests of policy holders. The governor signed house bill 66, providing for township organization, and for dividing counties into townships. This closes out the last bill in the hands of the governor.

BANKER SHOT BY A SENATOR. Fatal Combat Between Prominent Citizens of Covington, Ky.

CINCINNATI, April 11.—The greatest excitement prevails at Covington owing to a fatal combat between the two most prominent citizens of the city, and among the leading ones of Kentucky. An old feud has existed between State Senator Goebel, the neighbor and personal friend of Secretary Carlisle, and John Sanford, president of the Farmers' and Traders' National bank of Covington, Ky. They met on the street while returning from lunch about 1 o'clock, when Goebel opened fire. He shot twice, both shots taking effect. Eye witnesses say that Sanford was felled by the first shot. Senator Goebel at once gave himself up. A large crowd soon assembled. While the shots were made in the vicinity of the bank the excitement spread all over the city.

OVERPOWERED THE DRIVER. Robbers Seize Sixteen Thousand Dollars From a Cripple Creek Stage.

CRIPPLE CREEK, April 11.—The mail and express wagon, which connects with the Midland Terminal railroad at Grassy, was boarded today about two miles from this city by two men, who overpowered the driver, Robert Smead, accompanying an express package containing \$16,000 and escaped on horseback.

Traded Plows For Votes. PERRY, O. T., April 11.—The Perry Hardware and Implement company has gone into the hands of E. D. Nims as receiver on the petition of F. D. Lowrey, one of the partners. The company, according to the petition, consists of Lowrey and Mr. Ford of Kansas City. Ford is now clerk of the county. Lowrey charges that Ford spent \$1,300 of the firm's money in seeking his election, and that he traded plows to farmers for votes.
