The City Fathers.
The city council met in regular session Monday evening. The first business transacted was a canvass of the vote cast at the late city election. The vote on the several candidates ranged from 57 for councilman to 226 for member board of education. The clerk was instructed to issue certificates to the newly elected officers.

James Belton asked for the privilege of erecting an outside stairway on the south side of the building he intends erecting at the corner of Fifth and Spruce streets. The communication was referred to the committee on public improvements.

The Farmers and Merchants' ditch company asked for a right-of-way for their ditch along the entire length of Second street. This petition was referred to the proper committee.

The applications for liquor licenses were next considered and additional bondsmen were required of Messrs. Laing and O'Brien. The bonds of Gertler & Waltemath and Landgraf & Waldo were approved.

The chief of the fire department presented his annual report, which was accepted. Certificates of service in the fire department were ordered to be issued to F. E. Bullard, F. J. Doran and J. R. McWilliams. Lists of the active members of the Third ward hose company and the hook and ladder company were filed with the clerk.

A warrant for \$90 in favor of the waterworks company was ordered drawn.

The committee to which had been referred the matter of granting a right-of-way through the north part of the city to the Cody & Dillon ditch company, reported that it had no power to act in the matter. The owners of the ditch must therefore pursue the course laid down by the statutes.

Bills for election expenses and some other expenses were either approved or referred to the proper committee.

The chief of the fire department was donated the sum of \$50 for his services during the past year.

The next meeting of the council will be held April 29th.
