FACTS TO REMEMBER.

That the election for the high school bonds will be held to-morrow (Saturday, Aug. 5th), and that the voting place is at the hose house in each ward. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

That the man or woman of the age of 24 years or over who has resided in the district forty days, who is assessed for real or personal property, or who has children of school age (5 years), is entitled to vote on the bonds.

That if the bonds are voted your taxes will not be as high as they were last year or this year, for the reason that the building fund levy of five mills will no longer be levied.

That the men who are the prime movers in the attempt to defeat the bonds do not have children in the public schools, are not interested in the welfare of other people's children, and are opposing the bonds for purely selfish and mercenary motives. Will you allow these men to influence you into voting against the bonds?

That in awarding the contract for the building the school board will favor-as far as is consistent with law and good business principles-the awarding of the contract to HOME BIDDERS.

That Architect Grant, whose plans for the building were accepted by the board, recommended that a resident of North Platte be appointed superintendent of construction of the building, and that the recommendation was very favorably received by the school board.

That if you are in favor of better educational facilities for your children or your neighbor's children, you should cast your vote for the bonds. Don't allow apathy to keep you from voting.
