Supt. Eves has been notified that the Creamery Company will now pay twenty cents per pound for butter fat, an increase of two cents per pound over the price paid during November and December. The receipts at the separator station have increased in the last few weeks almost 800 pounds and it is now receiving 2000 pounds of milk every operating day. As soon as the receipts reach 3000 pounds per operating day the creamery company begins to pay rental. As each operating day brings from two to three new patrons it is quite probable that by the last of February the receipts will have reached three thousand pounds.

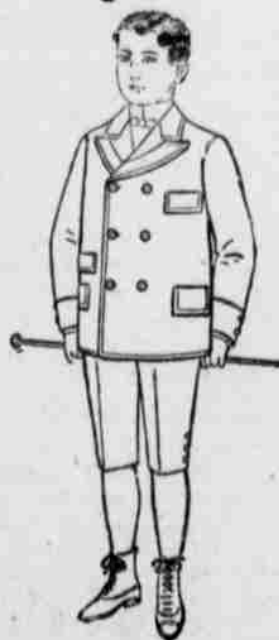
