The School Building Meeting.

The meeting called for Wednesday evening to discuss the new high school building was attended by a fair crowd. Mayor Bratt called the meeting to order and W. L. Park was chosen chairman. A resolution was adopted providing for the selection of a committee of six to confer with the board of education in regard to matter relative to the erection of the school building, three of such committee to be selected by the chairman of the meeting and the president of the school board, and the other three by the Commercial Club. Chairman Park and President Robinson named Major Walker, H. M. Grimes and C. F. Scharmann. one from each ward. The Commer-cial Club named H. S. White, W. L. Park and M. C. Harrington as its share of the committee, and those six gentlemen were declared to be the committee which will act in conjunction with the board of

education.

Joseph Weeks objected to the Commercial Club interferring with the duties of the school board, but Mr. Robinson and Mr. Sorenson assured the meeting that they, as members of the board, were glad the committee had been appointed and we are informed the other members of the board express themselves in the same vein.

Some talk as to the removal of the building to the west part of town, and also as to whether the present building should be torn down, was indulged in, but it seemed to be the sense of the meetthat such matters should be left to the school board and the committee appointed.

A Grand Social Success
