COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

April 26, 1900.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present Woodhurst and McNeel com'rs, and county clerk. Two bills of G. T. Field were allowed on the bridge fund for 57.72. Bill of Fred Tobias work on North River bridge allowed for 20.15. Appointments to office and bonds approved as follows: J. P. Mystrom Justice of the Peace; W. H. Cloud Road Overseer District No. 51. R. H. Eachus is hereby appointed superintendent of North River bridge until further notice. Wm. Johnson, superintendent Brady Island bridge reported 14 88 received from sale of old plank. Said sum is this day paid to the county treasurer. Where upon board adjourned until tomorrow.

April 27, 1900.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present full board and county clerk. Bill of A. Gustafsen allowed on the bridge fund for 5.00. Account of E. M. Johnson road overseer Dist. No. 38 allowed for 24.00 and a certificate issued on said district for the amount. Bond of T. J. Combs as overseer Dist. No. 40 approved. County treasurer is directed to refund 19.41 taxes wrongfully assessed on Sec. 1, Twp. 14, R. 33. Adjourned until tomorrow.

April 28, 1900.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present Woodhurst and Carpenter, commissioners, and county clerk. Bill of James Myers for repairs on North River bridge allowed on bridge fund for 4.50. E. E. Bristone is hereby appointed road overseer district No. 46 and his official bond approved. Upon petition of citizens being filed and it appearing to the board necessary that wings be constructed to protect bridges in Platte river the proposition of John Alexander to build said wings for North and South Platte river bridges for 12.00 is hereby accepted, county to furnish material. Whereupon board adjourned until Monday next.
