Railroad Notes.

Engineer Cheyne of the Fourth district is visiting friends in town today.

The dagoes working in the steel gang at Brady were taken west yesterday to shovel snow.

Engine 1835, Whitlock's pet, came out of the shops yesterday after having new valves put in and changes made in the front end.

A bulletin was posted Saturday designating the men who shall compose the wrecking crew. The bulletin announces the discontinuance of the wreck whistle, and hereafter the crew will be notified by call boys.

Railroad men say that the snow drift at Megeath was a mile long and ten feet deep. The sand which drifted with the damp snow made a packing that was extremely difficult to cut through even with a rotary snow plow.

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Union Pacific was held at Salt Lake Saturday afternoon and the capital stock of the company increased by one hundred million dollars, making the total capitalization \$296,429,400. The authorization of the issue of this additional stock is for the purpose of exchanging the stock for Southern Pacific securities in connection with the deal which was consummated by the Harriman syndicate some weeks ago. The new bonds will be secured by mortgage upon the company's property, and are to be exchanged during the next five years for Southern Pacific bonds, and the additional stock is also to be used to cover the purchase of the big system.

A March Storm.

One of the worst March snow storms that has visited this section for years began Saturday and terminated Sunday forenoon. Rain began falling Saturday morning which later turned to snow. A strong north wind prevailed during the storm which drifted the snow badly. The total fall of snow was about four inches.

Traffic on the Union Pacific between Ogalalla and Julesburg was suspended for over thirty-six hours, west bound trains being tied up at the former place and east bound at the latter. Four passenger trains were at the latter and three at the former place, while two were held here yesterday morning. The scene of the greatest difficulty was near Bosler, just west of Ogalalla, where snow drifted ten feet deep in a cut. Early Sunday morning a snow plow was sent up and pushed by one engine bucked snow without making headway. Later the rotary plow was sent up and the work pushed with vigor until ten o'clock Sunday night when work was suspended owing to the plow and engines getting stuck in the drift.

Yesterday morning a hundred or more men were sent up and by the use of shovels extricated the plow and engines. The snow had ceased drifting and during the afternoon the track was cleared and traffic resumed.

An attorney representing the Knickerbocker Loan Co., which is foreclosing lands in this county held in the name of J. R. Honeywell, was in town yesterday and paid the taxes on the land, the total of which amounted to nearly four thousand dollars.
