ifornia fruit and vegetables have been ventilated at this station and sixty-four cars have been iced.

The observation car, which came in from the west last evening, went east this morning.

Under the new scale of wages for enginemen the engineers on the 1700 class of engines will receive \$4.15 and the firemen 2.65 per hundred miles; on the 1800 class of simples and compounds the pay is 4.15 and 2.50 respectively and on the 1600 compounds the rate is 4.45 and 2.75 respectively. Switch enginemen will receive 3.50 and firemen 2.25 per day. Under the new scale engineers on the Second district will draw \$171.00 in a thirty day month if they make all trips.
