However, ignorance on the people's part is the main cause of the trouble. The first step should be for delegates from each ward to meet and discuss every phase of the school problem. In the Third ward there should be an eight room school house and it is most likely it should be built of reinforced steel concrete and it should be heated by steam. Owing to the railroad tracks the Third ward is somewhat isolated and should be treated differenty from the schools south of the track. The First and Second wards are ex-tending their limits both east and west so that the location of the schools are about right and it might be well to build the same size school as the one in Third ward, but the school house in the First ward has only a half block and it should have a whole block; this might be obviated by buying a block a little further east and build on it and sell the present location. Whatever is done now ought to have the future in view. To build three ward school houses such as we ought to have will cost about

The high school house is a misfit al the way through. It is wrongly located.
The children have to breath the clouds of dust which blow into the rooms as it is on the street that the wagons all pass going in and out of town. However, we are at the stage in the town's progress where we should decide for the best interests of the schools regardless of the present cost. As regards the present board of education it is equal if not superior to any board we have ever had. It is composed of business men who must attend to thier own business day times, consequently have only evenings to attend to school matters. They have no time to visit the schools and must be ignorant of the wants and conditions of the schools.

They do not serve because they wish to but because somebody must. Two of the members tried to resign lately but were not permitted. This state of affairs might be improved upon by electing women to the board, they would visit the schools and ascertain their condition and wants. They could have the board meetings in the afternoon. They naturally take more interest in the education and morals of the chil-dren then men do, and it is more than likely it would be for the interests of the schools. School teaching is almost exclusively by women. In all the ward schools of Omaha not one man teaches and if they are the best teachers they 'Phone 180.

And the way to do so would be to present a petition to the board praying it to call an election to vote on the proposition of ac-cepting the Initiative and Referendum law which the board would gladly do and if accepted you could take action toward building school houses. 

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Ne-braska, as hereinanter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the gen-eral election to be held Tuesday, Novem-ber 3rd, A. D. 1908.

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Sections two (2), four (4), five (5), six (8), and thirteen (12) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska:

Section I. Amendment proposed. That Section two (2) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. (Supreme court; judges; jurisdiction.) The Supreme Court shall consist of seven (7) judges; and a majority of all elected and qualified judges shall be necessary to constitute a quorum or pronounce a decision. The Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction in all cases relating to the revenue, civil cases in which the state is a party, mandanus, quo warranto, habeas corpus, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law.

Section 2. (Amendment proposed.) That Section four (4) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. (Supreme Gourt, judges, election, term, resideace.) The judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the electors of the state at large; and their term of office except as hereinafter provided shall be six years. And said Supreme Court judges shall during their term of office, reside at the place where the court is holden.

Section 5. (Supreme court, judges, election, five (6) of Article (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 6. (Supreme court, judges, election, time, chief justice.) That at the general election to be held in the state of Nebraska in the year 1911 and each six years thereafter, there shall be elected three (3) judges of the Supreme Court, who shall hold their office for the period of six years; that at the general election to be held in the state of Nebraska in the year 1911, and each six years thereafter, there shall be elected a Chief Justice of the Supreme Court whos shall held their office for the period of six years; and at the general election to the same of the Supreme Court, who shall held their office for the period of six years; and at t
