**Will Select Federal Building Site.**  
Richard Fourchy, of Washington, D. C., superintendent of construction of federal buildings, arrived in town last evening for the purpose of selecting, or recommending, a site for North Platte's federal building. Mr. Fourchy is today examining the half dozen or more sites that have been offered. He will make his recommendation immediately and it is believed that an announcement of the site decided upon will be made in the course of two or three weeks.

Until the selection of the site is announced there will be much speculation as to the location.

**Taft Visits North Platte.**

William Howard Taft, republican candidate for president, stopped in North Platte about twelve minutes this morning and made a brief speech from the rear car of the train to a crowd of a thousand men, women and children. The train was a few minutes late in reaching this terminal and this necessarily cut short Mr. Taft's speech.

Mr. Taft as he appeared on the rear platform was introduced by County Chairman Davis and received a hearty welcome. By reason of the strenuousness of the trip and many speeches made, Mr. Taft was in poor voice, and his words were only distinguishable by those near the car. He opened his remarks by saying that he was glad to find so many republicans in Nebraska, but said there was no reason why there should not be many, especially among the farmers, for certainly the prices of farm commodities during the past twelve years were such as ought to make every farmer feel friendly to the republican party.

He then for a few minutes reviewed the laws enacted by the republican party for the benefit of the laboring man, beginning with the eight hour law for government employes enacted under the Grant administration and following down through the several republican administrations, concluding with the employers' liability act, and the sixteen hour law relating to the continuous service of railroad men passed by the last congress.

Mr. Taft then briefly reviewed his decisions as judge in cases relating to labor, and to which Mr. Gompers, of the federation of labor, takes exceptions and is attempting to deliver the labor vote to Mr. Bryan. Mr. Taft's explanation of his decisions showed plainly that he held according to law and that the decisions were later confirmed by the higher courts. He had not finished his remarks along this line when the train began moving out.
