## Watson E. Beach Killed.

News reached town Wednesday of the accidental death of Watson E. Beach, a former banker and mayor of North Platte. Mr. Beach, who had made his home at Milanville, Pa., since leaving this city twenty years ago, was found in a dying condition in the railroad yards at Callicoon, N. Y., and the supposition is that he fell from a train on which he was a passenger. He died soon after being found. Mr. Beach was a member of a wealthy and influential family and during his residence in North Platte was of the "hale fellow well met" kind.

## Notice to Electric Light Patrons.

Since we changed our system to the "60 cycle" current which our new apparatus generates, have discovered that some of our meters, particularly one type of Westinghouse meter, are running too fast. The adjustment provided by the factory seems not to give the proper compensation for the altered current, and to standardize them will require a test of all our meters, which cannot easily be done without day service. We are now installing a new engine for this purpose and expect to be operating a 24 hour service by April 1st, and we propose to then make a careful test of all meters in use. Whatever per cent of inaccuracy develops, if in the customers' favor, will be placed to his credit, reckoning back to Jan. 1st, or will be refunded if preferred. We trust our patrons will consider this a fair adjustment of the difficulty. L. W. WALKER, Mgr.

## McKeown Becomes Superintendent.

As foretold in these columns Tuesday a bulletin has been issued announcing the resignation of H. L. Anderson as superintendent of the Wyoming division and the appointment of W. C. McKeown, the change to become effective next Monday. For a year or two Mr. McKeown has been assistant of the division. In his promotion another man who began his railroad career in North Platte goes to the front, for he began his service with the Union Pacific in the early 80's as a brakeman at North Platte. Later he became freight conductor and then a passenger conductor on the Julesburg branch. A few years ago he was made assistant superintendent of the Colorado division, and later transferred to Cheyenne as assistant to Supt. Anderson. It will thus be seen that his knowledge of railroad-ing has been gained by actual experience in the several lines of active work. That he will "make good" as superintendent of the most difficult division on the Union Pacific will not be questioned. The news of Mr. McKeown's promotion is received with pleasure by his North Platte friends.
