Misses Blanche Gansen, Ellen Krong and Garnett Mickelson were shopping in North Platte Friday.

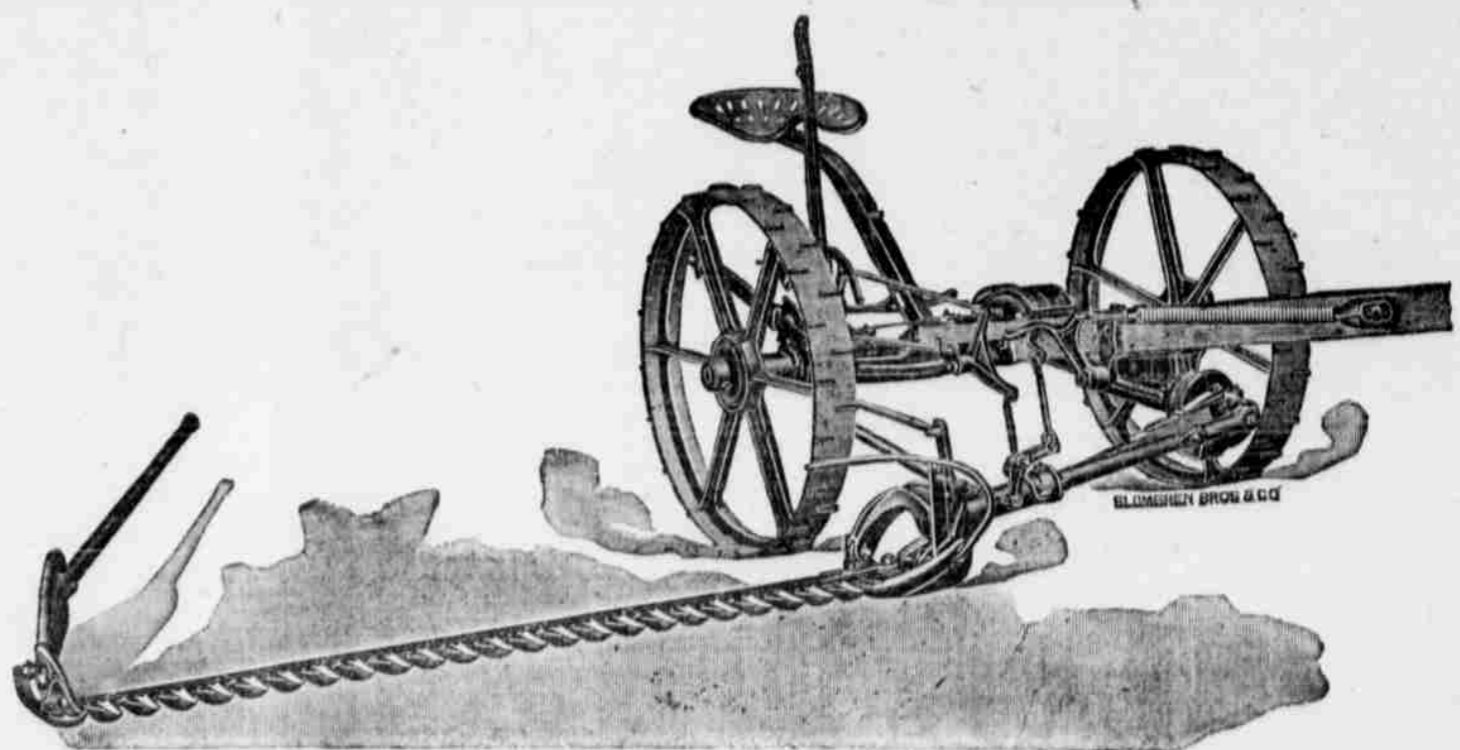
