Notice is hereby given that on the 20th day of July, 1909, a special election will be held by the School District of the City of North Platte in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, the polling places to be as follows: For that portion of said District north of the track of the Union Pacific Railroad Company at the Hose House in the Third Ward in the City of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska; for that portion of said District south of the track of the Union Pacific Railroad Company and west of Dewey St. and Public Road No. 4, which is a continuation of Dewey St. at the Hose House in the First Ward in the City of North Platte.

At which said election the following proposition will be submitted to the voters of said School District: "Shall the School District of the City of North Platte, in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, issue its negotiable bonds in the sum of \$100,000, in denominations of \$1,000 each, dated on the 21 day of August, 1909, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Nebraska in the City of New York, and payable as follows, to-wit: In twenty years from the date thereof, but may be paid at any time after ten years from the date thereof, at the option of the Board of Education of said School District.

"Said bonds to be issued for the purpose of erecting and furnishing one eight-room school building in the Second Ward of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, on Block 15 in said ward, and erecting and furnishing one eight-room school building in the Third Ward of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, on Block 32 in said ward.

And shall the Board of Education of the School District of the City of North Platte in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, be authorized to cause to be levied and collected a tax annually, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds, as the same mature, in addition to the taxes now authorized to be levied by law, on all property within said School District.

The ballots to be used at said election shall have printed thereon:

"For issuing \$100,000 of the bonds of the School District of the City of North Platte, in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, for the purpose of erecting and furnishing one eight-room school building on Block 15 in the Second Ward of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, in said District, and erecting and furnishing one eight-room school building on Block 32, in the Third Ward in the City of North Platte, Nebraska, within said District. Said bonds to be negotiable in form and to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Nebraska, in the City of New York, and which said bonds shall be due as follows: In twenty years from the date thereof, but may be paid at any time after ten years from the date thereof, at the option of the Board of Education of said School District. And for levying and collecting a tax annually, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds, as the same mature, in addition to the taxes now authorized to be levied by law, on all property within said School District."

Those voting against said proposition shall mark their ballots with an "X" after the paragraph beginning "Against" issuing the \$100,000 of the bonds of the School District of the City of North Platte, in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska.

Said election to open at eight o'clock a. m. and continue open until six o'clock p. m. central time, on said date.
