RAY C. LANGFORD, COUNTY COMMISSIONER. I respectfully announce myself as a candidate for county commissioner, subject to the action of the republican primary.

A. O. KOEKEN. I hereby announce myself a candidate for the office of County Commissioner of District No. 1, subject to the action of the republicans at the primary election.

R. L. DOUGLAS, COUNTY SURVEYOR. I hereby announce myself as a candidate for the republican nomination for the office of county surveyor, subject to the decision of the primary election.

Primary Candidates.

The primary election will be held Tuesday of next week, August 17th, and in accordance with past practice The Tribune presents an introductory sketch of the republican candidates for nomination for county offices. Owing to the legal mix-up of the law making county judge and county superintendent non-partisan offices, the names of County Judge Elder and County Supt. Ebright will not appear on the primary ballots, but both will go on the November election ballot by petition. And the same is true of County Surveyor Meyer, who will be a candidate for reelection.

Perhaps none of the candidates are so well known as I. L. Miltonberger, who seeks a renomination for sheriff for a third term. The duties of his office have called him into every precinct in the county, and in this way he has met, in one way or another, practically every voter in the county. And among this large acquaintance there is none who can say that Mr. Miltonberger has not made an efficient officer or that he has prostituted his office. There may be a few—we, however, know of none—who have become incensed at Mr. Miltonberger because in the performance of his duty as an officer he was compelled to take action that proved disagreeable to them, yet no fair man will ensure an officer for doing his duty. The only thing that is being urged against Mr. Miltonberger is that he seeks a third term, and while there are some who may not favor such, there are others who believe that an officer who does his whole duty, as Mr. Miltonberger has done, is entitled to further recognition.

Opposing Mr. Miltonberger in the nomination for sheriff, is Arthur Salisbury, of this city. Mr. Salisbury moved to Lincoln county with his parents twenty years ago and located in Plant precinct. There he remained for ten years, when he removed to North Platte and purchased a half interest in the Lock livery barn, later selling out to his partner and purchasing the brick barn on Front street where he continued in business until a few months ago, when he sold to an eastern party. Mr. Salisbury is a man who stands well in the communities in which he has lived and the confidence reposed in him is well merited, for he is an honest straightforward man with the ability and courage to well fill the office for which he is an aspirant. Mr. Salisbury has been making an active campaign and the race between him and his opponent promises to be a close and clean one. If he is nominated and elected, he will prove a worthy successor to the successful record made by Mr. Miltonberger.

We do not think any one will deny the assertion that F. R. Elliott has made an efficient, painstaking and economical county clerk. He has conducted his office in such a manner that the records are clear, comprehensible and kept up to date; instruments are filed and recorded as rapidly as received and dilatory methods have not been coun-

tenanced or allowed. These assertions will be verified by all who have occasion to use the records in the county clerk's office. During the past three and one-half years' incumbency of the office—or from January 1, 1906, to July 1, 1909—Mr. Elliott received as fees \$13,256.00, and during the same time the expenses were \$9,076.09, leaving a balance of \$4,149.91 to be turned into the general fund of the county treasury. Had Mr. Elliott been less energetic or afraid to work, more clerical help would have been necessary, and the net amount turned over would have been correspondingly less. Certainly his record has been one of efficiency, and like in the case of Mr. Miltonberger, the only charge is that he is candidate for a third term.

Wm Otten, who opposes Mr. Elliott for the nomination for county clerk, is the son of Herman Otten, one of the pioneer residents and farmers of Lincoln county. He is a Lincoln county boy—born and raised in the county, educated in our schools and a graduate of the North Platte high school. Since leaving school he has divided the years between filling clerical positions with North Platte business houses and helping with the work on his father's farm in the valley west of town. This writer has known Will Otten since he was a kid, and he has no hesitancy in personally endorsing him as a straightforward young man of ability, industrious and if selected as the republican nominee can go out in the campaign and make a winning fight. That Will Otten is a Lincoln county product adds to his popularity as candidate, and because of this and his known ability many will rally round his standard.

Ray C. Langford, as a candidate for renomination for treasurer, has no opposition, and this well, for any opponent would not be in the running, so efficient and popular has Mr. Langford proven during the first term incumbency of the office.

For the office of county commissioner from the first or North Platte district, there are two contestants for the nomination, A. O. Koecken, the present incumbent, and R. L. Douglas. Mr. Koecken is one of the pioneer residents of North Platte coming here when the town was in its infancy and Lincoln county nothing but a cattle range. He has seen the wonderful development of both town and county, has noted the increasing needs of both, and with his past experience of two years as county commissioner, he is certainly in a position to know the best needs of the people. As county commissioner his one aim has been to be fair with the people and do that which was for the best interests of the greatest number.

His opponent, Mr. Douglas, has been a resident of the county for a long term of years, residing in Myrtle precinct, until a year or so ago when he purchased property in this city and removed thereto. Mr. Douglas is well known as a man of integrity and honor, has good business ability and as county commissioner would fill the position creditably to himself and to the best interests of the taxpayers.

Primary Voting.

It is not too early for all who desire an honest expression of the public will to begin calling attention to the fact that under the new primary law voters are not allowed to mix their tickets in declaring their preferences for candidates. There is nothing to prevent a member of one party voting in the primary for candidates of the other party, but if he does so he must not vote for the candidates of his own party. He can only be a member of one party when he goes into the booth at the primary and can only aid in the selection of the candidates of one party. If he votes for candidates of two parties his ballot must be thrown out as worthless.

Under the provisions of the new law the candidates of all the parties appear on the same ballot, grouped in columns according to their respective parties. Ballots upon which the voter seeks to express his preference for candidates in more than one column will be cast aside. There will be blank lines upon which he may write in names of those whom he may prefer to those whose names appear printed upon the ballot, but he must not write in the column in which appear the names of those regular candidates for whom he wishes to vote, the name of a candidate appearing in another column on the ballot. If he does so his ballot must be thrown out.

The purpose of this is plain. It is to prevent the adherents of one party helping to nominate strong candidates for their own party and weak ones for the opposition, or vice versa. When a man goes into the primary booth he cannot belong to two parties, and he is presumed to be voting only for the candidates of his own.

Any effort made to direct attention of voters to this feature of the law will not be wasted. It seems hardly possible to make so much noise about it between this time and primary day that a great

many voters will not lose their votes by having their ballots thrown out. Too many men never do learn how to mark their ballots, even when a system has been long established, and when a new way of voting is being worked out it is a safe wager that many will go wrong.—Lincoln Star.
