**A Shining Example.**

Nebraska is wide awake in the matter of providing its people with books. Free circulating libraries in every school district will soon be in order, because of a law which compels each district to set aside annually the sum of 10 cents per pupil of school age for the upbuilding of a library. This will yield from \$3 a year to an amount several times as large in the villages, and in the smaller cities of the state, up to a point where there are 5,000 or more pupils when the compulsory feature fails to operate. In addition to the small libraries that will be built up in the rural district and small towns the state traveling library commission is working in co-operation with the school authorities and will send collections of books around the circuits of schools desiring them to supplement the home library. In order that the state and county school authorities may get a right start in library building, both in the choice of desirable books and in instructions to the pupils as to how to use them, the county school institutes are devoting attention to expert instruction concerning libraries. —Springfield (Mass) Republican.
