Charged with Illegally Selling Liquor.

A complaint was filed in the county court yesterday by Rev. Harry E. Tweedy, of Wallace, charging Frank H. Bent, a druggist of that village, with the illegal selling of liquor. There are twelve counts in the complaint. The sales of liquor is charged to have been made at various times between the 16th day of February and the 2d day of March, 1910.

Deputy Sheriff Lowell went to Wallace yesterday afternoon armed with a search warrant, and expected to make a search of the premises.

Stryker Bound Over.

A dispatch from York to the Omaha Bee dated March 3d is as follows: County Judge Wray has bound George Stryker, who is charged with embezzlement of funds of the York Alfalfa Meal company, over to the next term of district court. Evidence showed that during Stryker's short term of office as treasurer of the company he received \$3,800, and when he resigned there was only \$63 in the treasury, of which \$1,600 was kept, \$2,000 paid to his father and the balance to C. Nelson, formerly of Grand Island, who was tried and found guilty of embezzlement from the same company and is lying in jail here awaiting a new trial.

To Patrons of the Telephone Company.

Office of the North Platte Telephone Company, North Platte, Nebraska, March 4th, 1910.

In order to enable this company to render more effective service to its patrons and the public, in case of fire the following rules have been adopted at the suggestion of the fire department of the city.

All reports of fire in the city should be made by calling No. 500 at telephone exchange, give the location of fire by street and number if possible, or part of street for instance "West Second Street" or "East Second Street" as the case may be.

When a fire report is heard at Central, the following parties will be advised at once of the location of the fire. The Water Works Company, the Superintendent of the Water Works, the Fire Chief, and if the fire is in the business part of the city, the owner of the property involved and adjoining property owners. Inquiries from firemen or the hose houses will receive prompt attention. No attention will be paid to any other inquiries as to location of the fire until after the Water Works blow their "Fire Out" whistle.

It is only by the enforcement of this rule that the Telephone Company will be able to render their patrons the service they are entitled to during the progress of a fire, and we earnestly request the hearty co-operation of our patrons in the enforcement of these rules.

Above is published a copy of the new rule that will be enforced hereafter when a fire is reported to the Central Telephone Exchange.

It became necessary to adopt this rule for the reason that heretofore as soon as the fire whistle blew 500 or more phone users would call at once on Central to give them the location of the fire. It was a physical impossibility for Central to wait on these all at once and while they were trying to answer these curiosity calls the firemen would be waiting at the hose houses trying to get connection with Central and get the location of the fire, which was impossible to do on account of the demoralization of the telephone exchange by the flood of calls.

Heretofore a fire call has, for the reasons heretofore stated, put the telephone service out of business. In case of sickness or injury it would not have been possible to secure a doctor. No matter how the service might have been for its patron the company could not have rendered the service.

With the adoption of the new rules the company will be able to take care of the fire by furnishing information promptly to the fire department and the person immediately interested and render efficient service during the fire to all of its patrons.

The telephone company are entitled to the hearty support of all its patrons in this effort to improve its service.

The Sty Pilot.

Apologies to Ralph Connor for this title, but there is no other good way to name the manuevers of the American hog. On Tuesday the best hogs brought an even ten cents a pound on the hoof in Chicago. In Cincinnati they went even a trifle higher. At Omaha the top was \$9.65, with the finish not yet predicted. Needless to say, hog products kept pace with hogs, and pork is on a war time price basis.

What relation these extraordinary prices bear to supply and demand it will be possible to show with some definiteness when the figures of hog marketing for the year ending March 1 are compiled. A year ago hogs were about six cents in Omaha. That was after a year when hog receipts at all markets had numbered 35,197,000. Two years ago, after a twelve months' receipts of 34,400,000, the prices hopped four cents. This was the after panic slump. March 1, 1907, during the pre-panic boom, the price was a little under seven cents though the year's receipts had been only 30,978,000. That this year's marketings are lighter than last year's is certain. At Omaha hog receipts since January 1 have been 372,793 as against 423,947 in the same period last year a loss of about twelve per cent. But like figures from twenty other markets will be required to establish the full ration of decline.

The single case of hogs illustrates the complications involved in getting at the causes at the present cost of living. A packing trust is evidently not the direct cause of all the rise in the price of pork. The high prices paid the farmers prove that. But how far it is indirectly responsible who can say? When the panic broke, the packers depressed the price of hogs while raising the price of pork. Undoubtedly many a farmer sold off his stock in disgust at being in a business that placed him thus at the mercy of a middleman. That, as well as the high price of corn, must account for the present scarcity of hogs. Great scarcity there obviously is, when a price of ten cents draws only nine-tenths as many hogs to the Omaha market now as six cents lured forth last year.

The situation contains little prospect of early relief for the bacon loving consumer. It is likely the new crop of hogs will be small, owing to depletion of breeding stock under pressure of high prices for corn and hogs. Of that crop an unusual proportion must be held for the next year's stocking if the supply for ensuing years is to be increased. Not for three years at least is the supply likely to return to the relation to demand maintained when hogs were six or seven cents.—Lincoln Journal.

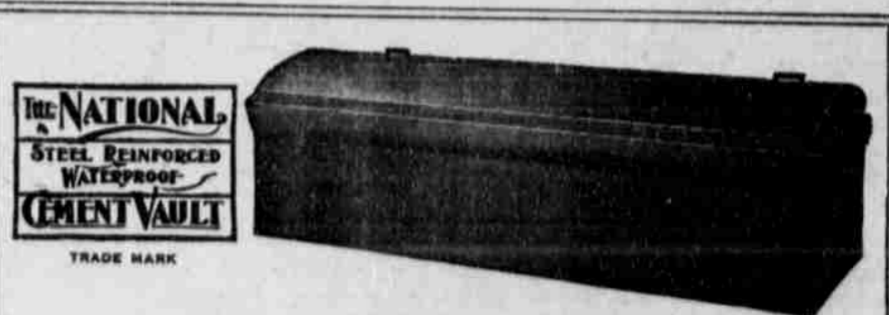
