Mass Convention.

Elsewhere is published a call for a republican mass convention to place in nomination candidates for city offices.

At a special election held in Kearney Tuesday for the purpose of voting on the liquor question, it was decided by a majority of twenty-five votes to grant licenses during the coming year.

Despairing at Philadelphia of making further progress toward a settlement of the street carmen's strike through conference with George H. Earle, one of the city's representatives on the board of directors of the Transit company, the committee of ten has renewed its effort to make a general strike more effective.

At the state county-option held convention at Lincoln Monday a resolution was adopted calling on all political parties to adopt planks in their platforms pledging the parties to the enactment of such a law.

Lowell's Cowboy Band—the best musical organization in the state outside of Omaha—began rehearsals Wednesday night with about the same complement of musicians as last season.

Strike Averted at Last Moment. A Chicago dispatch dated Tuesday was as follows: Danger of an immediate strike of 27,000 locomotive firemen, the throwing out of employment of more than 125,000 other employees and temporary suspension of business on practically every railroad system between Chicago and the Pacific coast was averted today through the acceptance of offers of mediation from the federal authorities at Washington.

At the request of the general managers of the forty-seven western railroads involved, Chairman Martin A. Knapp of the Interstate Commerce commission and Commissioner of Labor C. P. Neill telegraphed an offer of federal mediation to the union officials.
