This resolution will not be received with favor by many, who believe that county option or state wide prohibition should be put to a direct vote of the people. Such a course would result in a more absolute and certain expression of the people, as it would be unmixed with political issues.

Despairing at Philadelphia of making further progress toward a settlement of the street carmen's strike through conference with George H. Earle, on of the city's representatives on the board of directors of the Transit com-pany, the committee of ten has re-newed its effort to make a general strike more effective. Carrying out the action taken by the State Federation of Labor at its convention at Newcastle last week, State President E. E. Greenawalt has sent out a call for a vote on a a state-wide strike.

Lowell's Cowboy Band—the best musical organization in the state out-side of Omaha—began rehearsals Wed-nesday night with about the same complement of musicians as last season. And right now arrises the question—what will the citizens do toward assisting the band financially? Will they expect the members to even go so far as to purchase the music used at the open air concerts, or will they chip in their dollar toward raising a fund of \$400 or \$500 for the band. People of North Platte have contributed \$700 or \$800 to a traveling theatrical company for one evening's amusement. To be fair should they not be willing to contribute a like amount for a series of weekly concerts that will extend from June 1st to September 15th? Strike Averted at Last Moment.

A Chicago dispatch dated Tuesday was as follows: Danger of an immedi-ate strike of 27,000 locomotive firemen, the throwing out of employment of more than 125,000 other employes and temporary suspension of business on practically every railroad system between Chicago and the Pacific coast was averted today through the accep-tance of offers of mediation from the federal authorities at Washington.

At the request of the general managers of the forty-seven western railroads involved, Chairman Martin A. Knapp of the Interstate Commerce commission and Commissioner of Labor C. P. Neill telegraphed an offer of federal meditation to the union officials. This offer was accepted, W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, stipulating, however, that action must be-

lating, however, that action must begin without delay.

The appeal to Washington was taken as an eleventh-hour move to prevent a walk-out which, it was declared, threatened the greatest railroad strike since that of 1894. Thirty-seven members of the western federated board of the brotherhood at midnight last night formally voted for a strike. The hour for striking had been set for next Monday morning and the members were prepared to start for their homes—some of them as far as the Pacific coast—to of them as far as the Pacific coast—to put the strike into action when the mediation steps were taken.
