Club Favors Capital Removed.

The board of directors of the Commercial Club held a meeting last evening and passed a resolution favoring the removal of the state capital to a more central location. 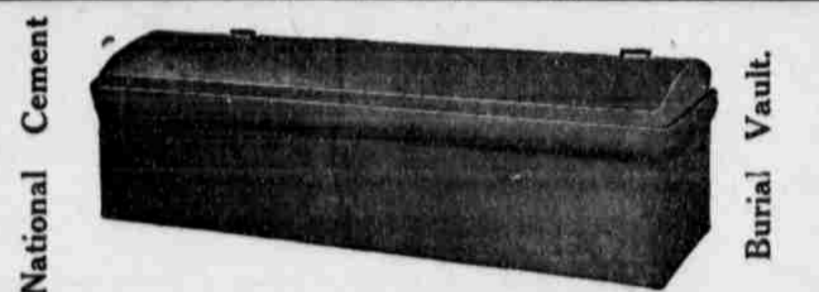
