To the credit of the citizens of Lincoln county it can be said that the county jail is without a prisoner. We are certainly a law-abiding people.

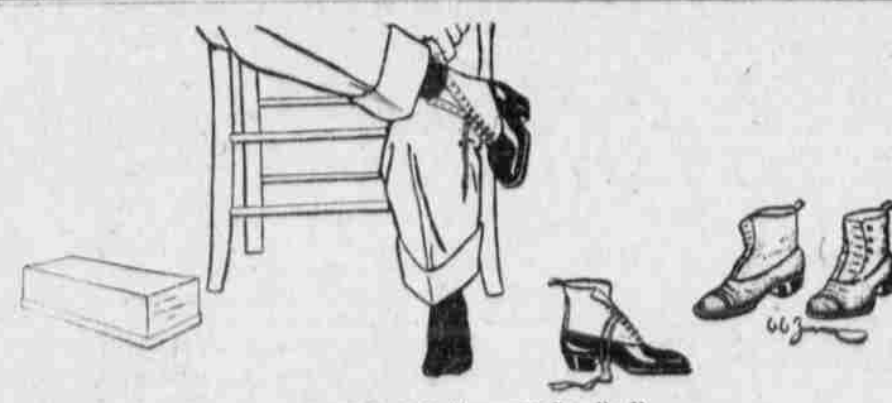
The Goozee building on east Sixth street will be fully completed next week, thus adding four large store rooms to the local supply.
