Residents of a number of towns between North Platte and the Wyoming line have sent word that they want the agricultural school located at North Platte and will use their influence in that direction. In some of these towns where commercial clubs exist resolutions endorsing North Platte will be passed.

Lieutenant Governor Mleville R. Hopewell died at his home at Tekamah Tuesday morning. For three terms he held the lieutenant governship, and was respected and admired by all. He was born in Indiana in 1845, served in the civil war, and then engaged as a bull whacker for freighters between Ft. Leavenworth and Laramie. He located at Tekamah in 1870.

Speaking of advertising Nebraska the Omaha Bee says: "Every newspaper in Nebraska is a permanent publicity bureau for the state. These newspaper ask no subsidies, but they are entitled to, and should receive, appreciative recognition of what they are doing, and substantial support from all other business institutions and members of the community that share in the benefits."

The legal battle against the forest reserves of the west in particular, and conservation by the federal government of natural resources in general was lost Monday in the supreme court of the United States. That tribunal not only upheld the constitutionality of the establishment of the reserves for any national and public purpose, but it settled once for all that the federal government and not the states may say how the reserves may be used.

By a majority of nearly 600 the city of Lincoln reversed its anti-saloon policy Tuesday, and voted to have twentyfive saloons at a license of \$2,000 each. The fight was clean cut, the personality of the two candidates for mayor cutting no figure as both were committed to carry out the wishes of a majority of the people on the liquor question. The result of the vote was a surprise to the "dry" element in Lincoln, who anticipated an increased majority against the saloons. For two years the sale of liquer had been prohibited, and it can be said that the proposition had been given a fair trial and found unsatisfactory by a number of the voters.

Ten thousand employes of the Pittsburg division of the Pennsylvania road went out on a strike Monday. These include the employes of the big shops at Altoona. The unions affected are the Brotherhood of Carmen, Bollermakers and Helpers, Sheet Metal Workers, the International Association of Machinists and Laborers, and the Federal Labor Union, an organization of foreign laborers about railroads, all of which are affliated with the American Federation of Labor. The cause is the allegation by the men that in its retrenchment policy the railroad dismissed men was were active in organizing and carrying on their unions.

In speaking of the city election in Lincoln Tuesday the State Journal said : Like the primary, the election all seemed to go one way. From the time the first precinct return came in last night there was hardly a glimmer of hope for the dry cause. The wets gained even in the dry wards so consistently that there was never a doubt of their victory after the count began coming in. It was the worst shock the drys have had since they won their first victory two years ago. It will be a long time before some of them can realize what happened, and still longer before they can understand what brought about this unexpected result.
