Bills have been introduced in congress giving \$5,000 a year each to the widows of Grover Cleveland and Benjamin Harrison. This is one way this country takes of showing its appreciation of the services of its presidents.

W. H. Thompson, "the little giant" of Grand Island, announces his candidacy for the United States senatorship to succeed Senator Brown. Mr. Thompson is one of the recognized leaders of democracy in Nebraska. For many years he has been on the firing line and has not flinched, hence his title of the "little giant." If we are to be so fortunate as to have another democratic senator forced upon us, we know of none we would rather have than Mr. Thompson.

President Taft indulged in some plain talk Monday in explaining to twenty-five members of the National Grange that he does not intend to play politics with the Canadian reciprocity agreement, even if the enactment of that measure costs him the farmer vote. The president told his visitors bluntly that he was sorry to hear that republican farmers would desert the party if the agreement goes through, but fear of such desertion would not change his conviction as to the wisdom of such legislation. He said that he believed reciprocity to be the best thing for the whole country, and that he did not intend to argue it.

This week sees the beginning of the formalities leading up to the coronation of Britain's king on June 22. With six weeks of red tape and solemn stage play ahead of him, who would be a king! Move particularly a king who must take orders from a liberal premier today and a conservative premier tomorrow. The toil of a hod carrier will be light compared with the slavery of George V. to courts and parades and pageants. The program for coronation day alone fills six newspaper columns, and contains an infinity of formality calculated to fire the "joiner" with envy. To any American, used to the ways of a country where presidents may be slapped upon the back, this solemn parading seems droll and childish. But let us not grudge King George his pomp and parade. There isn't much else left to being a British King.—Journal.

The Lincoln correspondent of the Omaha World-Herald sent the following to that paper a few days ago: "Nebraskans will be permitted next year to see the rare picture of Victor Rosewater lending support to Congressman George W. Norris in the race of the latter for senatorial honors. Although the senatorial fight seems distant, the game is being played right now and as a part of it comes the report that Rosewater will not oppose Norris if the latter gives promise of being able to trim Senator Brown in the primaries." The Bee's opposition to Senator Brown is purely personal, it is not because Senator Brown has not made a good record as senator. Senator Brown saw fit to recommend a certain Omaha resident for a federal position, and it so happened that the Bee did not like the man recommended and opposed the applicant. This is the foundation of the Bee's opposition to Senator Brown. It is another instance of the Bee's policy to attempt to kill off politically those who dare oppose it.

Juarez in Hands of Rebels.
El Paso, Tex., May 10.—The white flag is floating over the Mexican barracks at Juarez and the surrender of the city by the federals to the rebels under General Madero is complete. When the attack was resumed this afternoon, four shots from the rebel artillery tore such large holes in the barracks that the white flag immediately was hoisted and at 12:45 except for occasional shooting in the foothills, the firing had ceased.

The main street of Juarez is in ruins, some of the houses being riddled with bullets. Plaster, brick and piles of debris are scattered everywhere. Windows in many of the stores have been crushed in, but rebels are guarding the entrances to them to prevent looting. Some of the houses have been demolished by the dynamite bombs and shells.

Dr. Zuniga, in charge of the federal hospital for the last three days, admitted at 11:35 o'clock that he had treated over 100 federal wounded, twenty of whom may die. Around the customs house, the church and the jail between thirty-five and forty federals, he says, are lying dead in the streets.

Boyhood Days.

As we speed through life, on the wings of time, our thoughts go back to our youth at the approach of the circus. Arguments are being made in congress to find a way to reduce the cost of food, and particularly to reduce the wide gap between what the consumer pays and the producer receives. Congressman Rucker, of Colorado, the other day presented some startling figures in regard to this gap on food consumed by New York City. For instance while the consumers paid over \$60,000,000 for the potatoes they used, the farmer only received \$8,000,000; the eggs consumed cost the consumers \$28,000,000, while the farmer received \$18,000,000 for the same eggs; the difference in cabbage was \$8,000,000; in coffee it was \$10,000,000. In fact in nearly all the items that go to make up the food supply a larger share went to the distributor than to the producer.

One long blast and several short ones, from a siren whistle larger than any fire alarm in the state, will announce the arrival of the Omaha and South Omaha business men when they are within half a mile of North Platte on Tuesday, May 23. Those towns which have whistles to give fire alarms have been warned by the Commercial Club of Omaha that their fire companies may not have useless runs. Frequently when this whistle has been blown on former trips, the reception committees ran away from the depots and got out the hose carts to fight fire, only to have their visitors arrive and see a fast run in search of a fire. For this reason the Omahans want it known that they carry such a whistle and it will be remembered the day and the time of their arrival.
