The Tribune sees no evidence of local activity in the proposition to build a road way from Omaha to Denver, and it suggests that some interest be displayed. It is true that of all the counties through which this river-to-mountain road will pass none are so big as Lincoln county, and none other than Keith and Deuel are so sparsely settled. This road, from the east to the west line of Lincoln county, taking into consideration its more or less zig-zag course, will be fully sixty miles long. To build a first class road for such a distance is a financial impossibility, but it is not beyond the possible to greatly improve the accepted main road running east and west through the county. Unless all the counties take an interest in this highway, the proposition might as well be dropped.

#### Additional Announcements.

Three additional political announcements appear in this issue, those of Geo. E. Prosser, candidate for clerk of the district court nomination, M. E. Crosby, who aspires for the nomination for county judge, and C. C. McGee, of Sutherland, who wants the democratic nomination for sheriff.

Mr. Prosser is so well known in Lincoln county that he needs little, if any introduction at our hands. For a quarter of a century he has lived with us, filling positions of trust with credit to himself. As clerk of the district court he has made an efficient officer; none could do the work more satisfactory than he has, and few would do it as well.

M. E. Crosby, who seeks the republican nomination for county judge, is a young attorney who located in North Platte a couple of years ago, having previously lived at Sutherland since childhood. He graduated from the law department of the state university

with high credit, and his ability in the legal work has been demonstrated since his admission to practice in the courts of this county. He is a man of excellent character and during his residence here has made many friends. Mr. Crosby will make a strong candidate.

C. C. McGee, who asks for the democratic nomination for sheriff, is a hustling young man whose present home is in Sutherland. He has lived in the county for a number of years, and for quite a while past has engaged in buying and shipping horses, and in pursuing this business has made a large number of acquaintances and friends. If the democrats want to nominate a man who will make a whirlwind campaign, they will do well to consider Mr. McGee.

#### Mrs. Singer Wants a Divorce.

#### Will Begin Construction in June.

The Union Pacific has begun the active campaign for the clinching of right of way from Callaway to Gandy and a party of employees of the road left Kearney Friday morning for Callaway to begin at once the making of contracts with owners of land. Plank contracts were taken by the men and an effort will be made to secure all necessary right of way so that the construction of the road can be started without undue delay.

"We are trying to buy right of way," said a local Union Pacific official today, "and we are going to buy it." It is generally understood that the people at Callaway and along the line have asked the Union Pacific to take charge, to secure right of way and start the construction work. It is probable that construction will begin the first of June.—Kearney Hub.
