Formally Organized Last Night.
The North Platte Chamber of Commerce was formerly organized last night with a membership of over one hundred and forty, and if one can judge by the enthusiasm displayed at the meeting last night the organization is certain to be of much benefit to North Platte.
The session was opened by Chairman Halligan and the report of the committee on membership submitted. This committee reported that every citizen approached had signed the list cheerfully and commended the move to organize a commercial body. Following this report, the committee appointed at the previous meeting submitted the constitution for adoption. This was read by section and discussed, some amendments made and then adopted as amended. Under the constitution the organization will be governed by a board of nine directors, the president and vice-president being members of the directory. The board will appoint the secretary, who will be a paid officer, and the treasurer. The dues will be a dollar a month payable quarterly in advance. Any citizen can become a member by signing the constitution and paying the dues.
The object of the club is to promote the welfare of North Platte in every way possible, not only in a business way, but it will dip into municipal affairs when such action is deemed necessary. Politics and religion will be eschewed.
Upon motion an informal ballot was taken for president. This developed a number of nominations, and it was moved that the four highest candidates be selected from the list and that on the following vote the one receiving the highest vote to be declared president and the next highest vice-president. This resulted in the election of E. F. Seeberger as president and M. J. Forbes as vice-president.
For the seven directors to be elected seventeen names were selected by a committee, and from this list the following received the highest vote: W. V. Hoagland, Ira L. Bare, J. Q. Wilcox, F. H. Garlow, W. P. Snyder, Harry Dixon and R. H. Stuart.
After presenting the request of the Maxwell people requesting the organization to use its influence in the effort to have train No. 5 stop at that place, the meeting adjourned.

Proclamation.
To the electors of the city of North Platte:
Notice is hereby given that on the 2nd day of August, 1911, in the city of North Platte, an election will be held, at which the following proposition shall be submitted to the voters of said city:
"Shall the city of North Platte issue its bonds in the sum of \$22,000.00, in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, dated Apr. 1st 1911, due in twenty years from their date, but payable at any time after ten years, at the option of the said city, to draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Nebraska, in the city of New York; said bonds to be issued for the purpose of obtaining money with which to erect a city hall, to accommodate the city officers and records, the fire department and fire apparatuses and police department. And shall the proper officer of said city be authorized to levy and collect a tax annually, in the same manner as other municipal taxes may be levied and collected, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature, in addition to the sum authorized to be levied by Section 82, Art. 3 Chap. 13 Compiled Statutes of the state of Nebraska for the year 1909, until said bonds and interests are paid on all the property within the said city as shown and assessed upon the assessment rolls of said city." Said bonds to be negotiable in form.
The polling places for said election shall be: in the First Ward at the hose house in said ward, in the Second Ward in the Commissioners room on the second floor of the court house in said ward, in the Third Ward at the hose house in said ward and in the Fourth Ward at the hose house in said ward.
The ballots to be issued at said election shall have printed thereon:
For issuing \$22,000.00 of the bonds of the city of North Platte, for the purpose of erecting a city hall, to accommo-

date the city officers and records, the fire department, fire apparatuses, and the police department, and for levying and collecting a tax annually to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature.
Against issuing \$22,000.00 of the bonds of the city of North Platte, for the purpose of erecting a city hall, to accommodate the city officers and records, the fire department, fire apparatus and the police department, and for levying and collecting a tax annually to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature.
Those voting in favor of said proposition shall mark their ballot with a cross, opposite the paragraph beginning "For issuing \$22,000.00 of the bonds of the city of North Platte and those voting against said proposition shall mark their ballots with a cross, opposite the paragraph beginning with "Against the issuing of \$22,000.00 bonds of the city of North Platte."
Said election shall be open at nine o'clock a. m. and remain open until seven o'clock p. m. of said date.
