In speaking of the unwarranted attacks on President Taft, the New York Evening Post says: We are glad to see that something like a protest at these unhandsome method has set in, and that a college professor has had the honor of taking the lead in it. At Madison, Wis., on Saturday, Prof. A. B. Hall of the university called for fair play for Mr. Taft. Holding a chair in the department of political science, Professor Hall is compelled to keep track of public events and gives It as his deliberate opinion that never in the history of the country has there been an executive who more rigorously enforced the law than President Taft. Himself a LaFollette man, the Wisconsin professor has the decency thus to speak out against the kind of underhand misstatement and muttered faultfinding that have been current. Mr. Taft may not be a great president; it may not be wise for his party to nominate him again; but he is entitled, to have the case against him put fairly and openly. There had been far too much whispering and secret intriguing and cowardly assault, willing to wound but afraid to strike.
