Baled hay is now selling in this market at \$10.50, with an indication of a slight weakening in prices. Buyers say the bulk of the surplus crop has been shipped out of this territory. Some claim that should we have a prolonged cold spring there will be a shortage of hay in this locality.

Data furnished by the local weather bureau shows last month to have been the coldest January since 1888, the mean for the month this year having been fourteen degrees, while the normal for the month is twenty-one. The lowest temperature was twenty-three below zero, and for fifteen days during the month the temperature fell below zero. The precipitation was seventy-four one-hundredths of an inch, which is about one-half greater than the average for the month.
