He had not driven far when a bolt of Hghtning descended, struck and killed the four horses, splintered every spoke on the four wheels of the buggy, and splintered part of the back of the seat on which Brunk was sitting. As the horses dropped dead in their traces, the sudden stop of the buggy threw Brunk over the dash board down on the horses, and he sustatned a brutsed leg by the fall but otherwise he was unlurt.
