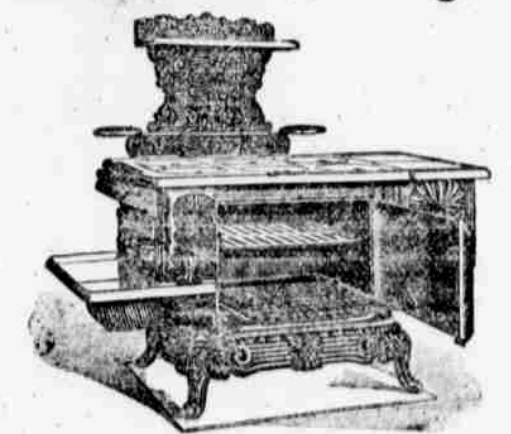

There are several cases of scarlet fever in town, but all in a very mild form.

John Harper has moved on I. N. Cooper's farm, where he will feed cattle this winter.

J. H. Veeder has sold his residence property to R. D. Waterman, who will move to town in a few weeks.

The sidewalk south of Titus & Williams' store and that in front of where the buildings burned out has been rebuilt.

The postoffice inspector visited Nemaha Tuesday. He reported everything in excellent shape at this post-office.

Every building in town of any nature that a family can live in is full and there are almost daily applications for vacant houses.

Frank Lesley came to Nemaha Wednesday on a few days' visit. He has been working on the Missouri Pacific at Glen Rock this summer.

Rev. E. S. Chamberlain informs us he will probably move back to Nemaha in the near future. He doesn't like it at Bethany so well as he expected.

Mrs. Thurman and daughter, Miss Minnie, returned to Atchison, Kansas, Monday, after a visit of some time with Frank Woodward and family.

Mart May went to Lincoln Monday, to consult an expert about the cancer on his face. It is probable he will have an operation performed before his return.

The dwelling house and Crother's harness shop that were burned at the recent fire were among the oldest buildings in town, both having been built in 1859, we believe.

George Fablinger and M. H. Carman, republican candidates for county judge and county superintendent, called on us Wednesday. They report good meetings wherever they go.

The B. & M. depot and platform has been raised about twelve inches and a new platform built, all of which improves the looks and adds to the convenience of things considerably.

Dick Burgess has bought the building formerly used as a scale house by the Nebraska City Elevator Co., and is moving it to the northeast part of town and will use it for a dwelling house.

John Elliott drove four men to Shubert Wednesday night. On the way there the carriage ran up on a high place on one side of the road and upset the whole load. The carriage top was badly damaged, but no one was hurt.

George Burgess, a son of Green Burgess, arrived in Nemaha Sunday of last week, with his family, from Illinois. He is making his home at present with his father, in Aspinwall precinct.

John B. Seid has concluded to quit farming and try town life for awhile, so he moved to South Auburn the first of the week. Wm. Seid has moved on the farm, his father occupying Will's house in South Auburn.

A. M. Engles, candidate for county clerk, and Wm. Watson, jr., candidate for sheriff on the independent or populist ticket, gave this office a pleasant call Tuesday. Mr. Engles and Mr. Watson are both nice men, but their politics—

The passenger train from the north has been about an hour late for several mornings, on account of work being done on the trestle work at Nebraska City. The B. & M. Company has been filling in a draw, and the trestle work has been so weakened that trains cannot pass over it, so everything has to be transferred.

Some one set fire to the coal house at the depot last Friday night. It was evidently the intention to burn the depot, and the scheme would have succeeded but for fact that the blaze was seen by a man who was sleeping in a car near the depot, who got up and put it out. There is no clue to the one setting the fire.

A number of attempts have been made of late years to get a good well of water on the Skeen farm, adjoining the Champion school house, but each attempt has resulted in failure until this fall. George Skeen pointed out to the well diggers a place to dig and they struck a big vein at twenty-eight feet. The water is now fifteen feet deep in the well and still rising. George doesn't claim to be a water witch, but certainly succeeded in finding water.

The Methodist ladies' aid society has decided to give a supper at the poor farm Thanksgiving night for the purpose of raising money to pay off the remainder of the church extension loan. At the time the church was built a loan of \$250 at 6 per cent interest was secured from the church extension fund. This was to be paid at the rate of \$50 a year and interest. In June, 1891, when the church was dedicated, the ladies' aid society assumed the payment of this obligation. The last payment is due January 1st, 1896. The ladies have to raise \$20 or \$25 more to meet this payment and want to make it at this supper. This will put the church entirely out of debt.
