John H. Dreury died at his home, three and one half miles north-west of Nemaha, on Monday, June 15th, 1896 at 2 o'clock p. m., aged 65 years and 4 months. Mr. Dreury had been a sufferer for many years from kidney diseases, which caused his death. He was a man highly respected for his sterling integrity and uprightness. Mr. Dreury was a member of Victory lodge No. — I. O. O. F., of Nemaha, and the funeral services were held under the direction of that order on Tuesday, June 16th, at the M. E. church. Rev. C. H. Gilmore preached the funeral sermon. The church was filled to overflowing by the friends of the deceased. The remains were buried in the Nemaha cemetery.

John H. Dreury was born in Butterwick, Lincolnshire, England, February 15th, 1831. He came to Nebraska in 1861. He leaves a wife and ten children, and a brother, Sonas Dreury, who is an old resident of Brownville.
