THOS. AND ANNA HIATT.

Rev. C. H. Gilmore has been returned to the Brownville and Nemaha circuit by the M. E. Conference. Without disparagement to the other ministers, it is the universal expression that Bro. Gilmore is the best preacher who ever served the people of this place, and he is gladly welcomed back to Nemaha.

On Saturday night of this week Hon. V. P. Peabody and Ed Lambert will debate the following question:

Resolved, That the platform McKinley is running on is more beneficial to the people of the United States than the platform that Bryan is running on.

Peabody affirms; Lambert denies.

The debate will take place at the Higgins school house.

On Wednesday Merritt Elliott was taken to Stella and Dr. Andrews extracted the piece of iron that Merritt got in his eye almost two weeks before. The sliver of iron is about one-eighth of an inch in length. It cannot yet be told whether he will lose the sight of the eye or not. Strange to say, Merritt has suffered very little from the presence of the piece of iron in his eye.

Joe Littrell had his trial last Monday, before Judge Lambert, for assault on Minor Taylor. After listening to the testimony the judge fined Joe five dollars and costs, amounting to about \$37.00. On the second charge of using the revolver promiscuously Joe was bound over to the district court, the bond being fixed at \$200. He declared he would not pay the fine or give bond and went to jail, but afterward evidently changed his mind, as he gave bond and paid his fine Wednesday.

Mrs. Ellen Grieves Bennett was born in St. Lawrence county, New York, Feb. 12th, 1820. In January, 1845, she was married to Samuel Bennett. In 1855 they moved to Iowa with their small family, and three years later moved to Nemaha county, Nebraska, where she made her home until her death, which occurred at 3:30 a. m. Friday, Sept. 18th. The funeral services were held at the M. E. church Saturday afternoon, the sermon being preached by Rev. J. W. Taylor. Mrs. Bennett has for several years been a member of that church.

The Bryan democrats and the populists in this county have been trying to make people believe these are separate organizations, but have hard work doing so. At the democratic county convention held a few weeks ago Dr. Kay and Dr. Keeling were selected as members of the central committee from Nemaha precinct. Dr. Kay refused to act, so Joe Littrell, who is one of the populist leaders and who was a delegate to the populist county convention last spring, was put on in the Dr.'s place. We suppose he was the most representative democrat they could find in the precinct.

The Nebraska Conference has paid for all church purposes \$6 for each member—man, woman and child—during the conference year ending in September, 1896.

We are told that a poll was taken of the ministers present at the conference as to their political preference. One minister only was a democrat, four were for free silver, and over one hundred were for McKinley.

Rev. Wm. Cowley goes to Marquette. Rev. J. G. Day to Strang, Rev. J. G. Walker to Steele City, Rev. A. B. Whitmer to Wymore, Rev. G. M. Couffer to Cook. Rev. G. E. Price is returned to Elk Creek.
