Dwight L. Moody, the celebrated evangelist, died at noon Friday at his home in East Northfield, Mass. His last words were: "I see earth receding; heaven is opening; God is calling me." He was 62 years, 10 months and 17 days of age, and had been engaged in evangelical work for about forty years, and was one of the most successful evangelists that ever lived. He was the author of many religious works.

To this fresh question the editor of Forest and Stream replies: "There is but one adult Theodore Roosevelt so far as we know, and he is governor, colonel, author and ranchman. Mr. Roosevelt's activities have extended in many directions."

The report of the Burlington railroad for the fiscal year ending June 30 has just been issued. It shows that the Burlington is one of the few American railroads that operate over 7,000 miles and earn more than \$40,000,000 per annum. The Burlington system has now grown to 7,597 miles, and is still building extensions. During the year covered by the report its earnings reached the enormous total of \$42,284,070, or \$789,000 more than the previous year. It is worthy of mention that this gain is entirely from increased passenger, mail and express business, the freight earnings having fallen off. The detailed figures of the report show that the company has liberally spent money for improvements of railroad and equipment, and indicate that the Burlington standard of efficiency, always high, has been maintained.
