There was a good attendance at both places and much interest manifested. Mr. Carrington is too busily engaged in looking after the duties of his office to do much campaigning, but would like the votes of all who believe he is doing satisfactory work as superintendent.

The populist orators at the convention last Saturday were evidently not very well posted as to the history of the party before the fusion, as none of them appear to have ever heard of the election of any reform candidate before fusion. J. M. Burress was elected county clerk, Henry Culwell sheriff, Frank Snyder treasurer, John I Dressler commissioner, Ike Storms representative, W. M. Crichton, superintendent, and probably several others whom we have forgotten.

Yesterday afternoon the jury in the district court in the case of Lena A Gallant vs the Supreme Tribe of Ben Hur found in favor of Mrs. Gallant, the plaintiff. Mrs. Gallant sought to recover the life insurance carried by her husband, the late Phil Gallant, in the Ben Hur order, and the jury awarded her the amount asked for, \$1,400 and interest. Phil Gallant was one of the Gallant brothers who were drowned in the Missouri river a year ago last month.

There were no witnesses to their death and but one of the bodies was ever recovered from the river. Mrs. Gallant was represented by Pitzer & Hayward, the lodge by John C Watson. —Neb. City Tribune.
