Nemaha Assessment

Nemaha county has reported to Secretary Bennett of the state equalization board an increase of \$120,000 in its property assessment over that of 1906, not including railroad valuations of either last year or this. Richardson county, adjoining, has gained \$137,500, subject to changes by the county board. This is a growth of more than a quarter of a million dollars in the taxable property of only two counties. If anything like that ratio keeps up throughout the state, the aggregate valuation will run beyond \$325,000,000. Last year it was \$313,000,000, and Secretary Bennett has figured the probable total for 1907 at \$322,500,000, but is now inclined to regard this figure as too conservative.—Lincoln News.
