Friday and Saturday, the 6th and 10th will be preparation days. All entries will close on Saturday, the 10th. The exhibition proper will open promptly on Monday morning, September 12, at 8 o'clock at which time all exhibits must be in place. These stipulations will be rigidly enforced, as a matter of justice to both exhibitors and the more rushing and daring. management.

Freights of all kinds, and passengers when desired, can be unloaded immediately at the main entrance gate. Passenger trains run into the fair grounds. An experienced, accomodating master of transportation will be constantly in charge and give special attention to this matter. No fair graund is more favorably and conveniently conditioned in this respect.

The grounds used this year, and which will be for three years to come, are the same as occupied previously, and which were at that time, regardless of expense almost, fitted entirely with new improvements, halls, stables, stalls and pens, water and weather proof in all respects. One hundred and ten acres enclosed with high, tight board fence, grounds artistically and conveniently laid out with avenues and drives, and planted to trees. The best half-mile track in the west having been in use for fiftern years past The water suply is pure and inexhaustible, and conveniently furnished through pipes and hydrants in every pertion of the grounds.

The premium list, by-laws, rules and regulations, have been carefully and thoroughly revised and corrected. The premium list enlarged in scope, classes, and lots, and in all important matters reclassified. New and seperate buildings will be erected for new and growing industries. The buildings erected last year will be enlarged where need be, to accomodate increased demands. New and more extended transportation facilities to and from the grounds will be provided.

The aim and object of the board will be to make the fair of 1887 as much better in all respects than that of 1886, as it was of all its predecessors. The harmonious, united efforts of all citizens, in all parts of the state is earnestly invoked.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, May 19th, 1887. The past week was full of interest to people of Washington as well as to the hundreds of strangers who came hither through interests scientiffic, business and social. I may say there were four national conventions. First came the hotel proprietors, representing all the leading cities and all the leading hotels in the United States, who talked over matters of mutual interest, exchanged ideas and experiences and had a good time generally.
