

An Important Proclamation
From Saturday's Daily.

BEATRICE, Neb., Nov. 21.—[Special]—Squatter Governor N. K. Giggles today issued the following proclamation repudiating the usurpation of the deposed squatter governor, J. W. Pearman, as follows:

WHEREAS, One J. W. Pearman, illegally assuming to act as squatter governor, has called out the state militia occupying the Omaha federal buildings to put down an uprising of two drunken Indians; and

WHEREAS, The said Pearman is without authority to issue said order, he having been duly impeached and removed from office and the undersigned having been duly chosen as his successor; and,

WHEREAS, If said militia should obey said order, serious complications might ensue, owing to the difficulty there might be in distinguishing the forces of the contending parties; and,

WHEREAS, Should said militia succeed in accomplishing the purpose for which they have been ordered out by said Pearman, the said Indians will be deprived of their usual and legitimate avocation of drinking fire water; and,

WHEREAS, Said Pearman is inciting said militia to insubordination and mutiny by giving them full rations of his coarse Superior prose instead of choice tid-bits of poetry, to which their delicate constitutions are accustomed; and,

WHEREAS, Said militia are already weary and footsore and are sadly in need of rest, because of their life herculean and heroic efforts in driving the women and children from the polls of Omaha and in preserving from profanation the sacred ballot boxes of the city; and,

WHEREAS, Great and unusual service is about to be required of said militia in defeating the allied Powers, who have already cleared their Deeds, to keep General Boyd from being fired from this stronghold into the capitol.

Therefore, Having in view the welfare of the state at large and to the end that the dark ante-bellum days of the reign of Governor James should not be repeated, I hereby revoke the order so issued by said J. W. Pearman, except as to the part requiring Major John B. Fury to take charge of all original packages and said militia are hereby ordered, under penalty of law, at once to throw up their arms and disband.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of state to be affixed at the city of Beatrice, this 21st day of November, A. D. 1890.

The Whiskey Trust Knocked Out.

Nebraska City is in luck, having through its attorneys dissolved the injunction that had been allowed against the operation of their new distillery. From the Press we clip the following: "Mr. Watson said that it was one of the greatest law battles ever fought and that this was the first time the whiskey trust with a capital of over \$35,000,000 was ever doomed and that the distillery in Nebraska City would be the only one in the United States out of a trust. The trust appeared to give a bond for any amount if the injunction was granted, but both Judge Caldwell and Judge Dundy refused emphatically to grant the orders. The lawyers for the trust were Ambrose & Duffy, Judge Thurston and Judge Woolworth, and for the distillery, Mr. Watson, Mr. Warren and Hon. John John L. Webster."
