Aristotie's Manuscript Found. LONDON, Jan. 31.-The Tim's announces that the authorities of the British museum have discovered among a collection of papyrus rolls, acquired recently in Egypt, the text of Aristotle's treatise on the Constitution of Athens, from which numerous writers of antiquity quoted, but which has nicherio known only in detached fragments. The treatise may now be seen at the British museum, where fac similes of it are now being prepared. The opening chapter is missing and the concluding chapter is mutilated, but otherwise the manuscript is in perfect condision. There is little doubt about the genuineness of the manuscript, because nothing was known of the contents of the papyrus roll when purchase L. The Times says this discovery is almo t unprecedented in the whole history of

classical learning. Russia and Austria.

VIENNA, Jan. 21.-The Neue Freie Press says that the importance of the visit to St. Petersburg of Prince Ferdinard of Bulgaria cannot well be overestimated, inasmuch as his journey is made in the interest of peace and is an increasing assuring evidence of the friendly relations which exist between Vienna and St Petersburg The paper believes that the visit will demon-trate that the Czar does not intend submitting to Pan-Slavist influences so long as Austria wishes to maintain peace with her Russian neighbor.



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
