CALL FOR PRIMARIES.

A republican county convention is hereby called to meet at Weeping Water at 10 o'clock p. m., July 28, for the purpose of selecting nineteen delegates to attend the congressional convention to be held at Nebraska City July 28, and twenty delegates to attend the state convention to be held at Lincoln on the 4th day of August, in accordance with the call of the state and congressional committees, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

The basis of representation of the different wards and precincts being fixed at one delegate for every fifteen votes or major fraction thereof cast for George H. Hastings for attorney general at the general election in 1890, and one delegate-at-large for each ward and precinct.

One of them was a manager of the Western Union Telegraph company and the other was a newspaper man. The newspaper man had been supplied by the manager with a book of telegraph franks. The manager had in the meantime cooled off, and the humor of the situation appeared unto him. So he sent the book back with the following rejoinder: "My Dear—, I return the inclosed, as I think upon reflection that you will agree with me that a mere personal difference between us is hardly sufficient to justify your withdrawal of your patronage from the Western Union company." Notice of appointment of Miss Maggie O'Rourke as deputy register of deeds to terminate July 16th 1892 was filed and approved.

By order of the board the treasurer is hereby instructed to correct tax receipts for the years 1890-91 as shown for lot 33, sec 13-12-13, so as to include lots 23 and 60; lot 33 having been divided so as to form lots 23 and 60 and both having been assessed at the same amount as the original lot 33 was assessed, it is to be by making a double assessment.

The board ordered that the assessment on six houses owned by Peter Keil of Eight Mile Grove, for the year 1892 be cancelled as said houses were burned up by the recent fire which recently destroyed F. Guthmann's barn.
