The supply of standard silver dollars decreased nearly a million. Subsidiary silver increased over four million, which is an interesting fact. These new dimes, quarters and halves were needed for the convenience of exchange. There was a large increase in gold certificates, also in silver certificates, but the greatest of all in silver treasury notes. The government has paid out \$08,051,057 under the silver bill of 1800 in the purchase of silver bullion, the payments being made in new certificates, redeemable in coin, the government being the judge of whether the roin of redemption shall be gold or silver.
