GOING FOREIGN MONEY.

Howgate Seen.
SEEN ON THE STREET.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—It is reported that H. W. Howgate, ex-sigant officer, who escaped from the custody of a bailiff in this city about a year ago, while awaiting trial, was seen on the street today by an officer of the signal service.

GRESHAM AT WASHINGTON.
Postmaster General Gresham arrived tonight. He was received at the depot by a committee from the Indiana republican club, and driven to the residence of John W. Foster, where he met many old friends and was introduced to many new ones. He will be the guest of General Foster for several days.

WILL COIN.
Secretary Folger had a conference today with the director of the mint and the Hawaiian minister in regard to the request of the Hawaiian government to have its silver money coined at the United States' mint. It was decided to grant the request. Preliminary arrangements for the coinage will be made at once.

A MEMORIAL TO THE PRESIDENT.
A memorial has been sent to President Arthur by the president and board of directors of the central committee of national labor legislation, petitioning for an extra session of congress, to be called as early as practicable, for the purpose of considering the relations between labor and capital. The memorial is issued for the purpose of promoting certain legislation proposed by a resolution in the senate adopted in 1882. They call the attention of the president to the fact that nearly a year has elapsed since the adoption of the resolution to investigate the relations between capital and labor, and yet no report on the subject has been made by the committee to which it was referred, nor is there any sign of remedial legislation. They add: "It appears to your memorialists an absurdity for a committee of grave senators to go around the country on junketing feasts at the public expense to gather culminating facts patent to all who read, and it is trifling with the indignant feelings of intelligent workmen, who are the aggrieved parties."

A BLASPHEMOUS LIBEL.

PIENIX PARK MURDERERS.

SLAVES SOLD.
GIBRALTER, April 10.—Four slaves were sold in the public streets of Tangiers near the British legation. The Europeans in Tangiers are indignant.

ROME, April 10.—The king has signed the decree ordering the formation, as quickly as possible, of seventy-two new companies of territorial and Alpine troops.

WILL PLEAD GUILTY.
DUBLIN, April 9.—One of the men actually participating in the murder of Cavendish and Burke has declined to be defended. He declared his intention to plead guilty. He has no hope of escaping conviction. The name of the man is withheld, but it is believed that it is Patrick Delaney.

THE LIBEL.
LONDON, April 10.—Charles Bradlaugh, W. J. Ramsey, proprietor of the Free Thinker, and G. W. Foote, editor, charged with publishing a sketch of the Deity, and blasphemous libels were arraigned before Lord Chief Justice Coleridge and a special jury. Bradlaugh, denying that he was responsible for the publication, appealed for and was granted a special trial.

RELEASING A NUN.
MONTREAL, April 10.—Bishop Fabre referring to the case of a young nun who wants to be released from the convent here, says: "She can leave the convent when she wishes. No one will hinder her in her civil rights, but by her vows she assumes for five years certain obligations which is a matter of conscience for her to decide to abandon. Her release from her vows, which will soon expire, has been asked at Rome and refused."

JOE BRADY'S TRIAL.
DUBLIN, April 10.—The trial of Joe Brady, indicted yesterday for the murder of Lord Frederick Cavendish and Burke, which was to have begun today has been postponed until tomorrow, owing to Dr. Webb Adams, who was appointed by Judge O'Brien to act as counsel for Brady, declining to conduct the defense of the prisoner. Adams gave as his reason that he was not prepared. The court house was strongly guarded today.

GALLAGHER'S STATEMENT.

LONDON, April 10.—Tracy Gould, an American lawyer, applied today at Millbank prison for an interview with Gallagher, whom he wishes to defend. Gould's name not being on the roll of English lawyers, the governor refused him admission. Gallagher then asked William Dove to defend him. Gallagher has prepared a statement to the effect that he came to England on a tour, and met Wilson accidentally. He accompanied Wilson to the latter's lodging, being glad to get with a fellow countryman. He had not been there five minutes when arrested. Wilson declares that Gallagher was innocent of the contents of the box found at Wilson's lodgings. He says he first met Gallagher in Brooklyn, where the latter attended in the capacity of a physician.
