### WASHINGTON NEWS.

An Important Suit.

Leave of Absence Granted.

THE COONS CAN GO.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The assistant secretary of the treasury has issued an order granting a leave of absence on the 16th inst. to colored employees in the treasury who desire to participate in the emancipation celebration.

A LARGE ORDER FOR PRINTING.

The largest order for printing blank forms ever given to the public printer is that of the commissioner of internal revenue for blanks and labels required in carrying into effect the provisions on the law relative to the rebate on tobacco and cigars. The order is for 50,000,000 labels and 25,000,000 blanks for the use of manufacturers and dealers.

GRESHAM TAKES THE OATH OF OFFICE.

The oath of office was administered to Judge Gresham today, and he assumed formal charge of the post-office department. The suite of rooms occupied by the postmaster general were thrown open and the employees notified that he was ready to receive them. The reception occupied about three quarters of an hour.

A RAILROAD SUIT.

Argument was commenced in the supreme court today in an important case of the Illinois Central railroad company, plaintiff in error, against the people of the state of Illinois. This was a suit brought by one Jno. M. Mars, in the name of the state, against the railroad company under an act of the legislature passed May 22d, 1873, entitled "an act to prevent extortion and unjust discrimination in rates charged for the transportation of passengers and freight." The plaintiff alleges that the railroad company charged him higher rates on a quantity of salt shipped from Chicago to Tuscola than that fixed by the railroad and commissioners, appointed under the act above mentioned. The company admits the alleged overcharge, but maintains that the state commissioners had no legal authority to fix rates for transportation of merchandise over its road, and that the act which assumes to give such authority, is unconstitutional and void, for the reason that it impairs the obligation of a contract between the state and the company embodied in the company's charter. The case was submitted to the circuit court of Douglas county, upon the agreed statement of facts. That court held that the act was constitutional and valid, and assessed a fine of \$1000 against the railroad company. Judgment was affirmed by the supreme court, and the case now comes here upon a writ of error for a final review.

Boston, April 11.—In the suit of Lizzie Gannon vs. Father Elemeing, which was brought to recover \$5,000 damages because the latter had taken away some paper images to which the child had become attached, the jury brought in a verdict of one cent damages.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., April 11.—The jury in the slander suit of Helen M. Gougar, editor of Our Herald, and public lecturer on woman's suffrage, against Henry Manler, chief of police, brought in a verdict assessing the damages at \$5,000. It was alleged by the defendant that Mrs. Gougar had been seen in the law office of Captain Dewitt Wallace, a prominent politician and attorney. The defendant pleaded justification, and the trial was a bitter one, lasting eleven weeks. The defendant moved for a new trial.

MILWAUKEE, April 11.—The prosecution in the Scheller case opened with C. D. Fash, president of the Newhall House company, who described the house and its exits.

He was followed by John J. Antisdel, proprietor, who corroborated his statements, and told of meeting Scheller on Michigan street the moment he (Antisdel) ran from the burning building, and said Scheller's actions for some time previous to the fire had been bad. He was accused of having drank a great deal, and gambled. It came out that Scheller was offended with Antisdel for sending his (Scheller's) wife from the hotel.

Johnny Antisdel, son of the proprietor, said when he and his father met Scheller, the latter exclaimed: "My God, Johnny: do you know how the fire caught?"

Firemen and shop keepers occupying the basement were examined as to what was there of an inflammable nature. It was developed that once before there was an incendiary fire in the basement near Scheller's coat, and Scheller's father-in-law, Baur, who recently died, had refused Antisdel and others admittance.

BERLIN, April 10.—The conservative party have gained an important victory in the election in the east of Prussia today.

PARNELL STAYS IN LONDON.

LONDON, April 10.—Parnell has decided not to leave London. He desires to attend the discussion of the criminal procedure act.

HIGH WATER.

BRANFORD, ONT., April 11.—The Grand river has risen eight feet in the past forty-eight hours. The north and south sides of the city are flooded. Residents are moving out in boats or occupying second stories.

REGALIA TRANSFERRED.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 11.—Crowds thronged the streets to witness the gorgeous ceremony of transferring the regalia of the imperial family from the winter palace to the kremlin at Moscow. A separate carriage was allotted each emblem.

REITERATING HIS INNOCENCE.

LONDON, April 10.—Bernard Gallagher, of dynamite notoriety, strongly urges his American citizenship. He has sent a letter to the United States minister, reiterating his innocence. His writing and spelling of the communication stamp him as a person of illiterate character. The London police continue their vigilant watch upon railway depots and steamboats landings. It is believed they are well advised from America.

THE OBJECT OF THE ALLIANCE.

ROME, April 11.—In the senate today the minister of foreign affairs said the sole object of the alliance between Italy, Austria and Germany was the preservation of peace. He emphatically denied the argument that these countries were characterized by any spirit of hostility towards France. It was useless to seek the manner and form of this agreement. The senate must be content to know that Italy is withdrawn from her former position. In regard to the agreement with the German powers it allowed perfect reciprocity of rights and left free institutions to each.

JOE BRADY'S TRIAL.

DUBLIN, April 11.—The trial of Joe Brady, on the charge of murdering Cavendish and Burke, began this morning. Notwithstanding the fact that it was known that absentees would be fined a hundred pounds, many jurors on the panels failed to appear. The case for the crown was opened by Porter, who pointed out to the jury that

the duty they were called upon to perform was one of the most serious that could fall on citizens. He exhorted them to dismiss from their minds altogether anything that they had read or heard in connection with the case, and be guided by the evidence produced at the trial.
