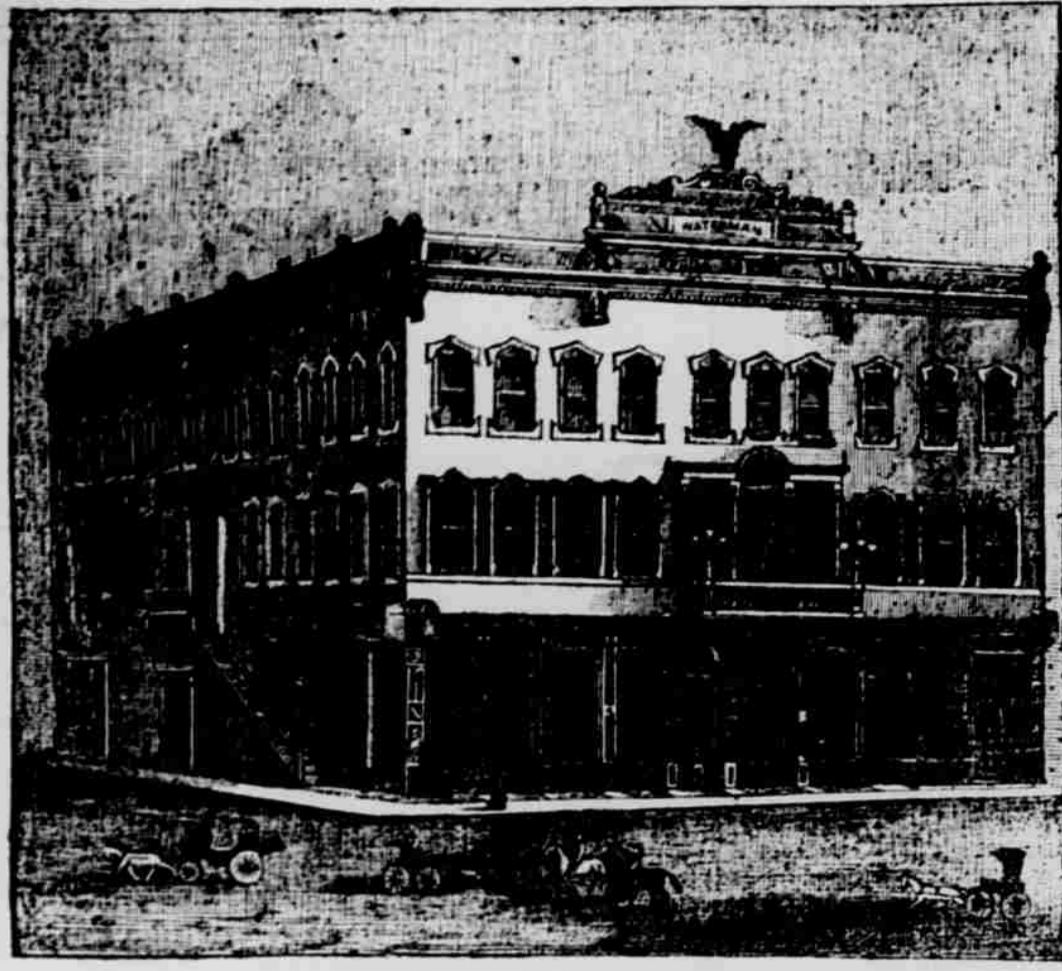

THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY. Washington, May 24.—The annual dinner in honor of the Queen's birth will be given by Minister West, at the British legation. Covers will be laid for thirty persons. Secretary Teller, Chief Justice Waite, General Sherman, Admiral Porter and the various foreign ministers are among the guests.

ABOUT GOVERNMENT LANDS. Secretary Teller has directed that in future registers and receivers of land offices must not receive filings upon odd sections of land granted to railroads within the limits of grants, withdrawn for indemnity purposes.

DECORATION DAY. First-Assistant Postmaster General Hutton issued an order today closing all postoffices on Decoration day between the hours of 10 a. m. and 5 p. m., except in the larger cities.

THE INVESTIGATION COMMITTEE. The committee appointed to investigate the charges against Hill, supervising architect of the treasury, met today. Murch stated he was prepared to go on with the investigation, provided certain privileges were accorded to him. He desired a full record to be made of all the evidence taken, and be furnished with a copy. The committee acceded to the request of Murch, soon after which an adjournment was had till tomorrow afternoon.

THE STAR ROUTES. In the star route trial Col. Ingersoll quoted from Bliss' opening speech, wherein Bliss stated that the prosecution would show that at least one United States Senator, urging an increase, was paid by an agent of the defendants. Where, said Ingersoll, was the evidence to that effect?

Bliss interrupted—I said I would do it if you would put him on the stand.

Ingersoll—But how could I know the senator? If you know of such a person it was your duty as United States attorney to bring him to justice, and if you did not do it you neglected your duty.

Bliss—Whose name was on the pencil memoranda? Ingersoll—That pencil memorandum bore the name of Jas. H. Mitchell.

Bliss—I would not for the world stain the reputation of another when he was not present to defend himself.

Ingersoll began the defense of John Dorsey, which was not concluded when court adjourned.

ARCHBISHOP'S RECEPTION. Limerick, May 24.—The inhabitants of this city and county are preparing a hearty welcome for Archbishop Croke.

HOW THEY CAN BE RELEASED. London, May 24.—In common's Trevelyn, chief secretary for Ireland, replied to Joseph Cowan, radical, declared that Davitt, Healy and Quinn could obtain their releases any moment by complying with the law. The judge who sentenced them, however, would be consulted as to the advisability of shortening their imprisonment.

THE PARNELL FUND. At a meeting of Parnellite members of parliament last evening, Justice McCarthy, chairman, said it was the bounden duty of Irishmen to contribute to the testimonial for Parnell. Referring to the Parnell circular to the Irish clergy he said the Irish people had only to repudiate the fraudulent statements which were made to the college of the cardinal. Bigger, member for Cavan, spoke in condemnation of the pope's circular.

FROM MADAGASCAR. Paris, May 24.—Advice from Madagascar say that the French detachment landed and carried several military posts erected by Harassan, in Sakalava territory in defiance of French rights. It is also stated that Admiral Pierre has occupied the custom house at Marungo, securing the road and water way to Tanerivo, the capital of the island. It is semi-officially announced that the object of the French expedition to Madagascar is to obtain the payment of sums due the French government from Madagascar by holding the custom house there as security for the amount. THE PROCLAMATION. Moscow, May 24.—The proclamation announcing the coronation was made this morning by the herald's alarms from a circular platform which was used in ancient times for the promulgation of ukases, and also for executions. Foreign ambassadors were present, attended by large escorts. The secretary of the senate read a proclamation stating that the Emperor Alexander has commanded that the holy solemnity of the coronation, and the announcement that the Empress will participate, with the help of Almighty God, will be performed on the 28th day of May. The emperor and Empress will only break their seclusion until Sunday to receive visitor from foreign princes.

THE NATIONAL REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE.

Atchison, Kan., May 24.—Col. John A. Martin, secretary of the national republican committee, has received a number of letters making inquiry concerning the next meeting of the committee, and as to what action has been taken looking to the national convention in 1884. Replying to these inquiries he states that the committee will meet in Washington on the 12th of December.

CREE'S CAPTURED.

Helena, M. T., May 24.—Benton advises state that Lieutenant Steele and a corporal ran on to a band of twelve Canadian Cree Indians near Mussel Shell, on the Missouri river. Finding themselves covered by the Indian guns, they withdrew, and returning with reinforcements, captured a band of fifty-two Indians, under the Cree chief Labor. The Indians have been started for Fort Assinaboine, and will be driven back into Canada.

A QUEER CASE.

Ft. Dodge, May 24.—A singular case of suspended animation occurred near Burnside station. A man became insane from religious excitement, and application was made for his admission to the insane hospital at Independence. He became sick and to all appearances died. He remained in that condition twelve hours, when he raised up unexpectedly, and was ready to oppose his removal to the asylum.

KENTUCKY REPUBLICANS.

Lexington, May 24.—The republican state convention concluded its session today, after nominating Gen. S. S. Frey, of Danville, for lieutenant-governor; L. C. Garrigue, ex-confederate, for attorney general; Leroy Hawthorne, of Newport, auditor; F. Lowry, of Paducah, treasurer; J. C. Pinkerton, of Grayson, superintendent of public instruction; J. W. Ashbury, Cyntiana, register of the land office.

THE NATIONAL RAILWAY EXPOSITION.

Chicago, May 24.—The national exhibition of railway appliances was thrown open to the public to-night. The opening exercises included prayer by Prof. David Swing, an address of welcome by Mayor Harrison, an address by Hon. Eli Washburne, an introduction of veteran locomotive builders and engineers by Vice President A. Finch. Owing to delay in securing power, much of the machinery intended to be shown in motion is standing still tonight. When fully going the scene will be a busy one. Among the brilliant and interesting displays for general public use is that of the United States Electric Light Company, which shows about 450 lamps, 200 of which are lights, and 250 incandescent burners. All sorts of positions and various conditions of shading under bright colored globes are shown. In addition the company will show a number of dynamos for the generation and transmission of power. The electric railway will be operated with one of its machines.

EXPRESS WAGON ROBBED.

Cleveland, May 24.—A United States express company money carrier Alexander Granger, received sundry packages of money and other valuables from the east bound Lake Shore train this morning at the Union Depot and put them into a buggy standing outside. Somebody from the ice room called to him, and nobody being in sight, he stepped a little way from the vehicle to ascertain who called. Returning he drove to the express company's main office, and there discovered two bags, similar to the company's pouches, but filled with brown paper, had been substituted for two with money. It is supposed the robbery had been carefully planned by experts, and executed at the moment Granger's attention was diverted. The missing pouches are said to contain in the neighborhood of \$15,000 in thirty packages of remittances from railway stations on the Lake Shore road between Chicago and Toledo to headquarters. The amount cannot be definitely known for some days.

THE BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

New York, May 24.—The eighth winder of the world, the eighth in point of time, due first, in point of significance, was today dedicated to the use of the people. Among the booming cannon, the shrill whistlings of many steamers, and the applause

was presented to New York and Brooklyn, the President of the United States and the officers of the Cabinet, the Governor of the State of New York and staff, and Senators and Representatives from every State and Territory, and the mayor of both cities being approving witnesses of the ceremony. As though to make up for the long period of inattention, possibly of doubt as to the bridge, Brooklyn burst forth today in regal style as an entertainer of her distinguished guests. While the bridge trustees had no thought of honoring Her Britannic Majesty in the selection of a day, they unconsciously enlisted the clerk of the weather by it. The Queen's weather, is a proverb in England and Ireland, and despite the sinister aspect until long past midnight Wednesday, asserted itself. The streets seemed a very mass of bright, blinding colors. No storekeeper had failed to give some token of his joy, and of the city's pride over the completion of the majestic span, which has grown almost like a spider's web under their eyes. The day was a holiday, and was participated in by all.

LATEST FROM THE STORM.

St. Louis, May 24.—Information has just been received that very heavy wind and rain storms swept throughout Howell county, Missouri, last Friday and Saturday, doing very great damage to farm and other property. Part of Howell valley is flooded. Bridges and embankments on the Kansas City, Springfield & Memphis railroad were swept away, or are badly damaged, delaying trains several days. The little town of Moody is destroyed, every house in it being blown down. J. McKelisey was severely injured. Several others were badly hurt. Farms in that vicinity also suffered severely. Information also comes from Maries county that a tornado swept entirely across it, making a path 10 yards in width, leveling forests and sweeping the ground of everything in its way. The largest farm in the county, that of James Kression, which is 3 miles long, lost all its buildings. The family barely saved their lives by rushing into the cellar of the milk house. A horse was picked up and carried a quarter of a mile. Several farm houses were destroyed. Farms on Maries creek were unfenced, but houses were spared. A turtle eleven inches in diameter was scooped out of the creek and dropped in Vienna, three miles distant. The farms of Gillespie and Mrs. Morris were swept clean of everything. In Miller county the storm was also severe. As far as heard from a dozen farms in the neighborhood of Iberia were ruined, and a school house torn to pieces.
