**A DAYS DOINGS.**

**The Usual Quota of Crime.**

**EXECUTED.**  
Indianapolis, August 8.—At Rockville, Indiana, today, Joseph G. Stout was hung for the murder of Taylor, Dunbar in November last. The prisoner displayed great coolness on the scaffold.

**MISSING.**  
Toronto, August 8.—Two young men, sons of Senator George W. Allen and Donald McInnes, left Barrie in a boat Saturday for the camping grounds four miles distant on Kemperfelt Bay, and have not since been heard from. It is supposed they have drowned.

**RAILROAD COLLISION.**  
Cairo, Illinois, August 8.—At three this morning a train on the St. Louis & Cairo narrow gauge railroad collided with an incoming train on the Wabash railroad when leaving the depot, badly damaging the narrow gauge train. No body was seriously hurt.

**SAFE BLOWERS.**  
Chicago, August 8.—A Journal McGregor, Iowa special says the safe in the store of Buckman & Bro. was blown open by burglars early this morning. The thieves obtained \$4,500, and made good their escape.

**PROBABLY WRECKED.**  
Chicago, August 8.—Portions of a wreck cast ashore near Grand Haven, Mich., lead to the surmise that the schooner Willie and Annie has been lost. She was engaged in the lumber trade, and had a crew of five persons.

**A VILAINOUS ASSAULT.**  
St. Louis, August 8.—Wm. Lanihill, eighteen years old, working for Hubert Huffman, a farmer living four miles south of Belleville, Illinois, took advantage of the absence of the family last evening and enticed Minnie Hartman, twelve years old, a niece of the farmer, to an outhouse, where he brutally assaulted her and fled. The girl was found terribly bruised. She suffered all night from convulsions, and there are little hopes of recovery. Citizens are hunting for Lanihill.

**AN OLD OFFENDER.**  
Chicago, August 8.—Michael Danner, station agent for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad at Marseilles, Illinois, was arrested today for the alleged embezzlement of funds of the Odd Fellows benevolent association, of New York, while serving as treasurer ten years ago. The story published is to the effect that the real name of the man under arrest is F. M. Manner; that after the discovery of the shortage in his accounts amounting to between \$3,000 and \$5,000 he went to Canada, and after search for him had been abandoned, returned to Illinois, married, and under his assumed name attempted to live down the memory of his former career. The prisoner is given a good reputation by the railroad company.

**THE GENERAL NEWS.**

**Storms, Saloon Openings and Base Ball.**

**DISASTROUS STORM.**  
Council Bluffs, August 8.—A terrible rain and hail storm swept through this, Sac, Shelby, Crawford and Mills counties doing much damage to growing crops. The tall end of the storm passed through a portion of this city and was about two miles wide, beating corn and all growing vegetation into the ground. It is regarded as one of the most severe storms that ever visited western Iowa.

**SULLIVAN'S OPENING.**  
Boston, August 8.—Fully 15,000 persons attended the opening of John L. Sullivan's saloon on Washington street. The bar room was packed with people, the rough element predominating. The services of the entire reserve force of the police station, with half a dozen mounted officers, were necessary to preserve order and keep the street clear. The crowd in main was good natured. Three arrests were made for fighting.

**STRUGGLING OVER CHINESE.**  
Washington, D. C. August 8.—The acting secretary of the treasury today received a telegram from the collector of customs at Tacoma, stating that his officers, with the assistance of the revenue steamer Walcott, had captured a sloop running Chinese across the line from British Columbia. Two smugglers were arrested, but nine Chinese passengers escaped. The collector declares that a large number of Chinese

had made their way across the frontier, which he was unable to prevent with the force at his command.

**KENTUCKY ELECTION.**  
Louisville, August 8.—The returns come in slowly now, but it is most certain that Knott's majority for governor will not be less than 40,000.

**THE EXPOSITION.**  
Chicago, August 8.—The Chicago annual inter-state exposition will open September 5, and continue till October 20. Preparations are now in progress.

**CUTTING THE WIRES.**

**The Latest Developments in the Strike.**

New York, Aug. 8.—Last night another onslaught was made upon the wires of the Western Union Telegraph company, the consequence of which is far more disastrous than that of the preceding night. Press Agent Somerville, of the Western Union, said this morning that twenty wires were cut on one route and fourteen on another between Passaic and Elizabethport. These were wires to Philadelphia and other points in the southern division. Twenty wires were cut between King's bridge and Scarsdale. At Tarrytown twelve Hudson river wires are down and eighteen wires in the eastern circuit are destroyed between Port Chester and Greenwich, Connecticut. The cross arms were sawed off in the latter instances. The wires cut, beside the first wires to go down, were those on the eastern circuit, which were lost about 11:00 o'clock last night. The others went down shortly after midnight. A large force of line men was sent out to repair the damages, and the lines are being repaired as rapidly as possible. The cutting of the wires interfered with others, across which they fell, so that great confusion was created for a long time, and business greatly delayed. Superintendent Hunsstone estimates that when the work was begun this morning one-half of the wires to Philadelphia and one-third on eastern circuits could not be used. The whole number of wires cut was eighty-nine, but nearly 200 rendered useless in consequence. A telegram from Fort Washington says a gang of men has interfered with the line men who were repairing them, and police protection has been asked in case the interference is repeated. No clue has yet been obtained of the authors of the mischief. The company is considerably put out by the new method of warfare. At the headquarters of the brotherhood of telegraphers it is emphatically denied that the cutting was being done by striking loemen.

**RAILROAD RUMBLINGS.**

**War in Rates.**

**THE NORTHERN PACIFIC.**

New York, August 8.—The Northern Pacific railroad will be connected about sixty miles from Helena, Montana on the 25th inst. but the formal opening will not take place till September 8, next. On or after the 25th inst. the company will be ready to receive freight to and from points on the Northwestern. Rates between St. Paul and Duluth and Portland, will be the same as between Council Bluffs and San Francisco. Through tariffs to Portland and other Pacific coast points are now being prepared and will be ready for distribution in a short time.

**THE SOLICITORS.**

Chicago, August 8.—The Hoosac Tunnel line put a solicitor on the board of trade today. The Chicago & Atlantic refused to withdraw its man at the order of the east bound freight committee. It is believed all railroads will be represented on the board in a few days.

**THEATRICAL BAGGAGE.**

The western association of general passenger and ticket agents met today for the proposed purpose of considering the question involved in the passenger war between Chicago and St. Louis, but adjourned after having prescribed 250 pounds as the maximum theatrical baggage, and making a rule that donkeys and dogs belonging to traveling troupes, will not be received as baggage but turned over to the express companies.

**THE RATE WAR.**

Scalpers today sold Illinois Central tickets from Chicago to St. Louis, at \$6.00, a cut of fifty cents below the late cut rate. Thus far Wabash and Chicago & Alton tickets have been going at \$6.50.
