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Rail Road Rumors.
It seems that, after all, the extension of the U. P. road from Genoa will touch Plattsmouth. A meeting was held Tuesday evening of last week, at which the proposition of the U. P. was read and very generally approved. They ask of Fullerton precinct \$17,000 in 20 year bonds at 7 per cent interest, forty acres of land for depot grounds and the right of way through the congressional township—three and one-half miles. It is understood, says the Journal, that Randal Fuller has offered to donate the grounds, and a committee has been appointed to secure the right of way.—Exchange.

Mr. Geo. G. Morrison, who is connected with the Salina, Lincoln & Fremont R. R. and is said to represent the New York capitalists who are interested in that project, was in the city yesterday and received a warm greeting at the hands of his old friends. To a Herald man who met him, Mr. Morrison said that the route runs through Beatrice, Lincoln, Wahoo, Fremont and Oakland, and the proposed terminus is at Decatur, on the bank of the Missouri River. "It is a north and south line," said Mr. Morrison, "and we make ourselves tributary to all the east and west lines that we cross, and also to the St. Paul & Omaha. Our principal idea is to get into the lumber regions, and the people on the line are all alive to the project of a people's road. Bonds are voted in Kansas from Salina to the Nebraska line; we will get the greater part of the right of way as well as the station grounds donated." Mr. Morrison will remain in the State and make the Millard Hotel in this city his headquarters until he gets through with the Nebraska organization.—Omaha Herald.
