A FORGER UNDER ARREST. Washington, Sept 20.—Wm. S. Whitford was committed to jail today, charged with forging checks on the sergeant-at-arms of the house of representatives, for about \$700, in the name of U. S. Senator Gorman and Congressman Talbot. Whitford was at one time private secretary to Gorman.

ANOTHER BOND CALL. The Critic says: "Another bond call will be made before the \$15,000,000 call just issued matures, which will be December 1st next. The nearest estimate that can be made fixes the further amount of bonds to be redeemed during the fiscal year at \$45,000,000. This would make the total amount of debt retired during that period about \$60,000,000, as \$45,000,000 have already been called in since July 30 last."

A TELEGRAM OF CONDOLENCE. The secretary of the navy today telegraphed Edgar I. Wells, of Hartford, son of Gideon Wells, Lincoln's secretary, with the death of Mr. Faxon, who was chief clerk of the navy department during the rebellion, who was appointed assistant secretary of the navy. Secretary Chandler has ordered a number of heads of bureau to attend the funeral. The department will be closed Friday afternoon, the day of the burial, out of respect to the memory of Mr. Faxon.

The civil service commission today received a letter from ex-representative Dezendorf, stating one C. C. Clark, Senator Mahone's political assessment agent, made an assessment last week of 5 per cent on salaries received by all employees in the Norfolk navy yard. Dezendorf says this is the third assessment levied on the same employees by the same man inside of a year. Lyons, chief examiner, says Clark is a government employe the matter will be laid before the president.

IMPENDING CHANGES. The Critic says there was a report at the treasury department today that there would be a number of changes in the office of the supervising architect of the treasury. The report mentions the name of Chief Clerk Jacobs and four or five others who would have to walk the plank. Among prominent treasury officials there seems to be no doubt a number of changes will be made in the architect's office.

THE MEETING OF PASSENGER AGENTS. Chicago, September 20.—The executive committee of passenger agents of eastbound trunk lines met today. It is stated the result was free and full discussion of charges of rate cutting by some of the lines, and consideration of complete harmony.

THE MERCHANTS' FREIGHT ASSOCIATION. Chicago, September 20.—The Merchants' freight association, organized for the purpose of protecting the interests of shippers, now number 300 members. It is expected to increase the list to 500.

WILL NOT ACCEPT SECOND PLACE. San Francisco, September 20.—It is currently stated that Senator Miller has declared most emphatically, that under no circumstances will he accept second place on the presidential ticket.

ONE DOLLAR FROM CHICAGO TO LOUISVILLE. Chicago, September 20.—J. C. Ernst, general passenger agent of the Pan Handle route, announces to-night and to-morrow and till further notice his line will make the rate \$1 from Chicago to Louisville.

THE EVANGELICAL CONVENTION. Chicago, September 20.—In spite of rainy weather the evangelical convention to-day and to night met no diminution in attendance. The doors were closed to-night at 6 o'clock on account of the crowd. The convention closed this evening.

FUNERAL OF JUNIUS BRUTUS BOUTH. Manchester-by-sea, Mass., September 20.—At the funeral of Junius Brutus Bouth this afternoon there was a large attendance of relatives and professional friends. The interment was in Rosedale cemetery.

AN ALABAMA DEAFULTER. Selma, Ala., September 20.—Tax Collector T. J. Britton, of Hall county, Alabama, is reported a defaulter for \$17,000. Friends claim no intentional wrong. The defalcation is said to have existed several years.

DINNER TO THE PRESIDENT. Newport, September 20.—Seth Barton French, whose guest President Arthur is, gave a grand dinner this evening in honor of the president. On Tuesday next the president will assist at laying of the cornerstone of the Burnside memorial hall.
