 Frontier and Fire News
 Judge Hoadly Abandons Campaign Work.
 News in General.

Indianapolis, Oct. 4.—The railroad war on passenger rates to Chicago will end at midnight tonight. A compromise has been effected by which the new Air Line division of the Louisville, New Albany & Chicago railroad will be admitted to the Union passenger depot and the privileges of the union track in this city.
 Sandusky, O., Oct. 4.—Judge Hoadly, democratic candidate for governor of Ohio, addressed a crowd here here last night. Today he was prosecuted and decided to give up the Toledo campaign, leaving for Cincinnati via Toledo this evening. He is much broken down.
 Kansas City, Oct. 4.—A Times Democrat, New Mexico, special says D. H. Leroy and George Wilson left here on the 19th of September for the purpose of rescuing Charles McComas from the Apaches and not returning without him. Arriving at Casa Grande, they found that Chief Juh had been killed on the 21st by falling from his horse while drunk into the Casa Grande river. Geronimo succeeds him as chief. Leroy and Wilson had much trouble in gaining an interview, owing to the unsettled condition of affairs in ignoring Juh's sons in the succession, and the fact that the Mexican soldiers were trying to get the Indians drunk presumably with a view to massacring them. The ambassadors finally secured an interview, and offered Geronimo 100 bolts of calico and 200 cartridges for the boy. The chief said the boy was with Juh's widow in the mountains, and she would not want to give him up, but he Geronimo, would compel her to release the child upon the payment of the ransom. At this juncture the Mexican soldiers appeared, and the chief broke off the interview. Leroy and Wilson were unable to see him again, and returned unsuccessful. Further steps, however, will be taken for the rescue of the child.
 Pittsburg, Oct. 4. At the scene of yesterday's conflagration large crowds today swarmed. Men are at work among the ruins. There were also a number of women. Small exhibitors who had lost their all in the fire, still keep up the search in a despairing way, hoping to save something from the general ruin. The origin is still unknown. The exposition managers hold firmly to the belief that it was the work of incendiaries and not caused by an explosion of benzine. The latest theory is that it was set afire for the purpose of robbery. The aggregate loss will be one million. The insurance is not one-fifth of this amount. The exposition society are erecting a high fence around the grounds.
 San Francisco, Oct. 3.—Senator Sharron today commenced suit in the United States circuit court against Aggie Hill declaring that the alleged contract of marriage between himself and her, claimed by Miss Hill to be in her possession, is a fraudulent document, that no such contract was ever signed by him, or promise of marriage given. He asks the court to compel Miss Hill to produce the alleged contract and retain possession of it that the fraudulence of the document may be proven. He denies ever having been married since he became a widower. He states that the object of Miss Hill in perpetrating the alleged marriage contract is to lay claim on his estate in the event of his death.
 Webb City, Mo., Oct. 3.—Val Hutton a miner, was killed by a premature explosion of vulcan powder yesterday and Tom Martin and Mr. Amos were fatally injured.
 NOT GUILTY.
 Hot Springs, Ark., 4.—The jury in the circuit court here in the case of Frank F. ... and ... for killing Charles Mathews, editor of the Hornet newspaper, rendered a verdict of not guilty.
 MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.
 Minneapolis, Oct. 4.—Lilly Anderson a Swede girl, who has been in America since June, and in Minneapolis for two weeks, disappeared mysteriously Monday night, and has been unheard of since.
 HANGED FOR MURDER.
 Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 4.—James McSteen was hanged this morning in the yard of the county jail. The execution was conducted quietly, and was witnessed by two hundred persons. At eleven o'clock he left the cell for the scaffold, attended by the priest and sheriff. He walked erect and ascended the scaffold with a firm step. When asked if he had anything to say, he replied "No." In the fall his neck was broken. In eight minutes he was pronounced dead.

On the evening of June 9, 1882, he sent his little boy out of the house on a pretense, and when the little fellow returned he found his mother lying on the floor with her skull crushed, and a bloody ax lying beside her. His father had flown, but was arrested the same night. When the trial came up it was clearly shown that he had committed the deed.
 YELLOW FEVER.
 San Francisco, Oct. 4.—Letters arriving from Guaymas and other points in Mexico show that not half the truth has been told of the ravages of yellow fever in those unfortunate cities. A letter received today from Geo. Trent, a well known pioneer Californian, better known as the owner of the famous race horse Thad Stevens, at Mazatlan, says, in order to give some idea of the violence of the scourge in this city, that out of an opera company of thirty-one members, seventeen have died, including the prima donna, in less than three weeks. Within two weeks more only five of the original troupe was left living. Medical men were all sick. Two of them died. The victims were buried hastily and uncoffined. Three hours was the usual interval between death and burial. For the last week deaths have not averaged more than twenty a day. The disease is, however, sweeping the interior towns like wildfire. Courts are all closed, and the judges fled beyond the jurisdiction of yellow jack. The spread of the disease is believed to be largely due to the ignorance of physicians of the character of the fever.
