He was afflicted with neuralgia of the heart. The immediate cause of his death is supposed to have been the shock.

Dr. Luce was an old and respected citizen, a brother-in-law of the late E. H. Robinson and son-in-law of R. E. Hougheboone, and was also related to Mrs. Richard Kimball, of this city. He leaves a wife and two children.

THE YOUNGERS AGAIN

Bruce Younger, said to have been captured in Wyoming, is in Council Bluffs—what the Accused Says.

The following in regard to Bruce Younger, one of the well-known Younger brothers is from the Denver Republican. The account of his arrest will be read with interest, especially when it is known that Bruce Younger, the original, is now in Council Bluffs and is not under arrest. The republican article says:

Last evening a Chicago detective, having custody Bruce Younger, a cousin of the famous bandits, took the 6 o'clock Julesburg train, en route for San Antonio, Texas. So much mystery has been connected with the affair that it has been impossible to obtain all the facts in the case, but sufficient is known to establish the fact that Bruce Younger is now on his way to Texas to answer the charge of murder, supposed to have been committed by the old James and Younger crowd.

Younger arrived from Cheyenne last evening, and was immediately incarcerated in the county jail of Arapahoe county. He was brought to the jail heavily manacled, and was taken last evening loaded down with irons. One report is to the effect that Younger was arrested in Rawlins, Wyo., and the other report is that he was captured at Cheyenne. Of one question there is no doubt, that he was arrested in Wyoming by a Chicago detective on the requisition of the governor of Texas, but Cheyenne is probably the place where he was captured.

The presence of Younger in Denver was not known until last evening, when he was taken in charge of a detective. There has been recognized by some of the police who formerly knew him in Denver. Frequently during the past four years a cousin of the Youngers has been in this city, but has not been here since about a year ago last fall. The police who saw the prisoner last evening say that he is the same Younger who formerly mingled with the sporting fraternity of Denver. At that time he usually stopped at the Planters' house, and was an intimate companion of the dead gambler, Frank Ross.

When interrogated by a reporter, he evaded the question as to whether he seemed alarmed at the idea of returning to Texas. So quietly and systematically was his departure effected last evening that the reporter did not succeed in obtaining the name of the detective who has Younger in charge. Those who remember Younger state that his name is Bruce, and as the Younger brothers have a brother by that name, this is probably the same person. The prisoner was possessed of a fine personal appearance. He was heavily manacled and closely guarded at the depot prior to his departure.

When the detective left Cheyenne last Sunday with his prisoner, it was supposed to be Bruce Younger, it was thought by the friends of the captured man that the detective had hurried on to Texas with the prisoner, but at this point the cause of the maneuvering of the detective became apparent. The prisoner's brother was at that time in hiding in secret in Cheyenne, it is supposed, and the detectives knowing that this brother would come forth from his hiding on the supposition that the detective had gone to Texas, Younger was brought to Denver, and on the day following his capture returned to Cheyenne.

Cole, Jim and Bob Younger are now serving life sentences in the state penitentiary of Minnesota. John was killed in Jackson county, Mo., by Detective Tull, of the Chicago police force, who was killed by John as he fell by the side of a train. Younger was a noted stockman, who was killed by union troops during the war. Bruce Younger is a cousin of the noted bandits, is brave and courageous, possessing all the family traits in that respect. Bruce is supposed to have been connected with the North Hampton bank robbery.

Younger was arrested on the killing of a man in San Antonio, Tex., about five years ago. The murder is supposed to have been committed by at least a part of the old Jesse James and Cole Younger band, and a heavy reward was offered for the arrest of the murderers. James Lambert admitted last evening that the detective held the prisoner by virtue of a requisition from the governor of Wyoming. Bruce Younger has a brother named Al, and this is probably the brother which is also reported to have been captured.

In conversation with a reporter with a Nonpareil reporter, Mr. Younger said that he had written to the governor of Texas, stating that if he wanted him he would go at any time without a requisition. He says, however, that he is a relative of the Al Younger, spoken of in the above article, and also stated that he has an uncle, Jeff Younger, who is at present residing in St. Clair county, Missouri, where he has served as a member of the legislature for several terms. He says he does not know who was arrested as him, but he says he will go to Texas whenever sent for.

Mr. Babcock was born in the town of Hamilton, Madison county, State of New York, removing from that State to Nebraska.

Mr. Babcock was universally respected and loved by his neighbors and all who knew him, although a great sufferer during his fatal sickness he bore his sufferings uncomplainingly and with great resignation; he leaves a widow and three (married) daughters residing in the neighborhood of Grand Prairie; his son, Charles H. Babcock, who used to reside in the same neighborhood, is now a citizen of California.
