NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The Pullman Palace Car company will tomorrow declare the regular quarterly dividend of two per cent, with an extra dividend of one and one half per cent, both payable November 15. It is stated that the net earnings for the year ending August 31 are about nineteen per cent, and since August 31, the earnings show a gain of over \$3,000 per day.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.
Wichita, Kan., Oct. 17.—A few weeks ago C. D. Long, a traveling salesman, started for his home near Newton, Kansas, with two hundred sheep overlaid through the Indian territory for Texas, accompanied by a woman named Nellie Baily, an ex-convict who was at Sedgwick city, and the driver Deason. A week ago Sunday, Baily was shot and buried south of Skiesora ranch. The woman and man kept on with the sheep. C. M. Hoinster, United States marshal at Caldwell, Kansas, hearing the facts, followed them and they were arrested and brought to this city Monday evening. They brought the remains of Botham back to Newton in a mercantile casket. The manner in which Botham was shot clearly shows that his death was not suicide. The affair has every appearance of a dark bloody deed. An examination will be held before United States Commissioner Sherman.

SHIP LETTER POSTAGE.
Washington, Oct. 17.—Postmaster General Gresham made the following ruling: The reduction on the 1st inst of domestic rate of postage from three to two cents reduced also from the same date, from six to four cents per half ounce, the double postage charge made in pursuance with section 391, Revised Statutes, upon letters for delivery in the United States commonly called "ship letters," which are conveyed to this country by vessels not regularly employed in carrying the mails.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.
Peoria, Oct. 17.—The grand lodge of Knights of Pythias occupied this morning with a grand parade, and this afternoon with a prize drill. In the latter the first prize of \$300 to the best drilled and disciplined division of uniform rank was awarded to Ft. Dearborn division of Chicago, and the second prize of \$100, to Lochiel division, of Elgin. Galesburg division was instituted this evening.

LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEERS.
Buffalo, Oct. 17.—The national convention of locomotive engineers has begun. All British American provinces and every state in the union except Florida are represented.

THE BRIBERY CASES.
Albany, Oct. 17.—Ex Senator Sessions, now on trial for attempting to bribe a senator, yesterday called in a senatorial caucus, to discuss on his own behalf that a conversation with Bradley not being said about money, no money was offered, and none passed between them.

TURKED UP.
St. Louis, Oct. 17.—The short-hand notes of the investigation before the late grand jury, which it is alleged has been in possession of the Post-Dispatch, were returned today by a messenger boy to the circuit attorney.

THEY WANT BONDS.
Chicago, Oct. 17.—The First National bank has notified its 130 clerks that they must all procure bonds, which will range from \$4,000 to \$5,000 each, and aggregate over \$320,000.

THE TIVOLI DISASTER.
Baltimore, Oct. 17.—The grand jury of Baltimore concluded the investigation of the Tivoli disaster, wherein the lives of sixty-five excursionists were lost. They find a presentment of manslaughter against Lawrence Albert, proprietor of the Tivoli grounds, and Frank De Biens.

JUMPED THE TRACK.
Vandalia, Ill., Oct. 17.—A passenger train going east jumped the track at Hagenstown, killing the fireman and wounding the engineer. A defective spring was the cause of the accident. No passengers injured.

TAPPING THE WIRES.
Chicago, Oct. 17.—Warrants were issued today for the arrest of C. F. Van Winkle and William Atkron, at the instance of the Western Union telegraph company, on charge of conspiracy. The trouble dates from last May, when the Western Union refused to furnish market quotations to bucket shops, and removed its tickers. As a consequence, the bucket shops have since been working all sorts of schemes to secure the reports, with varying success. For a time it was supposed they managed to receive the quotations by means of signs from the board of trade until the fact became known that they were quotations not only as fully but just as sent over the Western Union wires, and an investigation developed the fact, as alleged, that Van Winkle and Atkron had tapped the Western Union wire at the Union stock yards and run a bunch wire into a small office in his city, where the quotations were taken, and it is said, sent

to all the bucket shops. Van Winkle was held in \$1,000 bail until the 23rd for examination. Atkron has not yet been arrested.

FATAL EXPLOSION.
Oskaloosa, Ia., Oct. 17.—Last evening a central Iowa freight train on the track four miles north of this city, the boiler of the engine exploded, causing a bad wreck, nineteen cars being piled up in a space of 140 feet. The engineer, Edward Bagley, was instantly killed. The fireman, Charles Braneman, and Elmer Blanchard, were probably fatally injured. The boiler was carried forward 150 feet, and the wreck piled up thirty feet in height.

IRON DISCOVERED.
Eau Claire, Oct. 17.—The Leader today published the details of the discovery of a remarkable bed of iron ore in the northern part of the state. The discovery was made by Wm. Newell, of this city, and J. G. Throp, P. C. Putnam, A. D. Chappell and some Chicago capitalists are preparing to develop the mine. There is great excitement over the discovery, and a spur track is to be built from the Wisconsin central to the new mines as soon as a feasible one is raised to begin shipments. It is said to be the most valuable iron bed ever discovered in this country.

PUT UNDER BONDS.
Milwaukee, Oct. 17.—A Hudson special says David Hefferson and wife, living ten miles above here, were put under bonds of \$2,000, for assaulting a vagrant named John Wolf. Hefferson keeps a saloon and drinks a great deal. His wife became intoxicated and shot at Wolf, who was hanging about the place, but the ball missed him. Her husband took the revolver, and following Wolf, shooting him in the head near the temple, inflicting a wound but will cause death.
