INDIANA.
Indianapolis, June 19.—The republican state convention was called to order at 10:30. Hon. Stanton J. Peble was elected permanent chairman. The nominations for governor was made first in order, the committee on resolutions not being ready. Hon. W. H. Calkins, Col. W. W. Dudley and Gen. John P. Shanks named; Mr. Calkins nominated on first ballot, receiving 591 votes, Dudley 512, Shanks 48. The nomination was made unanimous. The platform adopted ratifies the platform of the national republican convention as sufficient for all matter of national scope, and heartily endorses the nomination of Blaine and Logan. It endorses the pure, dignified and patriotic administration of Governor Porter; favors legislation appropriation for a monument to those persons of Indiana who died to save the union; favors calling a convention to frame a new state constitution to take the place of that of 1850; favors such changes as shall take the administration of prisons and reformatory and benevolent institutions from out of the domain of party politics; favors the abolition of contract labor; renews the devotion to free schools; favors the equalization and adjustment of pensions and pensions to all honorably discharged soldiers of the union army; denounces the action of the democratic majority in the state assembly in displacing competent officials of benevolent institutions, by mere politicians. The state ticket was completed as follows:
Lieutenant Governor Eugene Bunty, of Henry county, secretary of state; Robert Mitchell, of Gibson county, auditor; Bruce Carr, of Orange county, treasurer; K. R. Sirel, of Marion county, attorney general; W. C. Wilson, of Tipp cano, superintendent of public instruction; B. C. Hobbs, of Parke, reporter of the supreme court; Wm. M. Huggatt, of Warrick, judge of the supreme court; fifth district, E. P. Hammond of Jasper. Convention adjourned at 9:30 after a continuous session since 9:00 a.m.

HOW THE U. P. LOST \$20,000.
Chicago, June 19.—A little bit of canvassing has just come to light in this city. A Chicago firm had seventy-five carloads of mining machinery to be shipped to Montana, for which the Union Pacific and Burlington had both made bids, the latter securing the contract. The Burlington offered to turn over the freight to the Union Pacific at Council Bluffs on condition that bulk should not be broken, but the cars taken through by the Union Pacific and Oregon Short Line. After this agreement had been vitiously made and the Burlington had contracted for the freight, an effort was made by the Union Pacific officials to divert the business to one of its tripartite allies. Hearing of this the Burlington people took the freight by their St. Paul line and transferred it to the Northern Pacific, thus cutting the Union Pacific out of \$20,000, the gross value of the business. When all the facts become known to the Union Pacific management lively times are expected.

HIGH WATER.
El Paso, Texas, June 19.—The Rio Grande river shows more water here and above than it has at any time in a quarter of a century. The horse railroad and the Mexican Central railroad bridges have been swept away, and the valleys below, to Camp Rice, and Old Fort Quitman, presented the appearance of a vast inland sea. The flats between the general town and the river, on which are the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad depot buildings, have all been submerged. The damage to Yaleta, Socora, San Elizabet and Camp Rice has been proportionately great. It is understood that the old American town of Presidio, Texas, has been nearly destroyed.

THE NICAURAGA WATER WAY.
Washington, June 19.—Secretary Frelinghuysen today communicated to the house committee on appropriations

and foreign affairs, at a joint meeting, the details of the plans of the administration in respect to the Nicaragua water-way. He said that the usual methods adopted for making these matters known to congress were taken for "real reasons," and asked that his communications might be received under restrictions of official secrecy. The committee after hearing the secretary, adjourned without action.
