THERE will be a great slaughter of booms in Chicago these days, and in puncturing, where blood will be found once, wind will be found twenty times.  
Iowa is jubilant over the observance of prohibition the first week after the law went into effect; but there is a reason for it—her democracy is all in Chicago.

The combat thickens. The braves are on the grounds from Tammany, and the prospects are that the convention will not have a harmonious session, as decisions and bitter strife is apparent both as regards candidates and platform. The great fact is admitted by the democracy of the country, that the party is divided on the tariff question. Those who insist on a radical change in the manner of raising revenue for governmental purposes, led by Watterston, Morrison, Carlisle, pronounced free traders, will not be satisfied with anything short of a square declaration against protection in any form; while upon the other hand that wing of the party which favors protection and is in favor of letting "well enough alone," will insist upon the "straddle" as it is called, or a meaningless compromise. At the same time, the opposition to Cleveland, in New York, is deep seated and earnest. Tammany is opposed to Cleveland because they prefer any other man, even dearest itself, to the man whom they know is unfriendly to their interests; while many leading delegates, realizing the fact that Mr. Cleveland is a weak man, in New York desire his defeat on the high grounds of the good of the party. In the meantime Ben. Butler with his labor forces behind him is on the ground much stronger and a much more dangerous feature than the democratic leaders have care to anticipate.

The Omaha Republican needs the fostering care of the disloyal editor of the Lincoln Journal Topics. The mercury stands too far up on the tube these July days to admit of sudden drops, and that of yesterday is too sudden and too radical for safety. From Mr. Blaine and the elect to a hopeless resume of our civil service and spoils system is too sudden and too much. "Something must be done," frantically shrieks that terrified organ, and so think we, and the Topics gang should do it. From the number of interrogation marks one would suspect that our senior Senator was organizing that paper against the consolidated and gigantic monopolies of the country and was getting off one of his county fair speeches. "The postmasters," with their "feudal" tenures. The "United States Marshals," with their "baronial" prerogatives, and the "Internal Revenue Collectors," with their "royal" retinues, must be "got rid" of in some manner.

Deferentially, we would remark, to the Topics man, that the great danger seems to be two fold; first, the offices are filled by a dangerous class, who are a standing menace to certain other close corporations that would be machines did they possess the gearing. In the second place these fat offices place before the public such irresistible temptations that the old rule of "rotation" in offices should at once be reversed. We admit, this state of affairs presents a dark picture—a problem a difficult of solution—and "something must be done." In the excitement and chaos of the moment, knowing that moments are precious and that there is no time to be lost, as everything might go to sticks in the twinkling of an eye, we would dare to suggest, to the Topics Physician, that if he could only convince this school of political hypochondriacs who have discovered (?) the cancer in our body politics, that Mr. Blaine will when elected, first, remove all these dangerous characters from office, and, second, refuse to fill vacancies, the problem will be, at least, temporarily solved, and we may possibly be enabled to get through with the present campaign without a breaking up of our great and glorious Union.

The fortunate thing of all this is, however, that portion of the rural press, which has been disinherited, is saved a very painful suspense, by being deprived of copies containing such fate-ful and gloomy forecasts of our country's dark future. However, "something must be done."

**WHAT CONGRESS HAS ACCOMPLISHED.**  
The first session of the Forty eighth Congress has extended over a period of seven months and four days, although the actual working time will not exceed 165 days. In that time there have been introduced in the Senate 2,367 bills and ninety-seven joint resolutions, and in the House 7,507 bills and 284 resolutions. Of these, sixty six Senate bills and ten Senate resolutions have passed both houses and become laws by Executive approval, and sixty-two House bills and thirty-two House resolutions became laws in the same manner. Three House bills also became laws without action by the President, and one was returned to the House with his veto. Of the measures introduced in the Senate 308 bills and seven joint resolutions were indefinitely postponed and six bills laid upon the table. In the House fourteen bills and three joint resolutions were postponed indefinitely. A majority of the measures introduced in both houses related to matters not of general importance, such as bills for private relief and pensions; for the erection of public buildings, bridging rivers, and other improvements of only local importance.
