The Cleveland and Hendricks Hippodrome, or Great Moral Exhibition; occupying by letters patent countless rings—Political Ignorance, Whereabouts of the Willow Halpin and Veto of bills for the amelioration of the working people, the most prominent, with more to follow—gave their grand weekly display, as announced, in Neville's block on Thursday night.

In the absence of the Chief Master of Ceremonies, Hon. Wm. Neville, of the First Ward officiated, and wielded the party whip. The combination evidently labored under serious disadvantages as the absence of some of the leading stars and character delineators was noted—they doubtless failed to connect, or were captured by some enterprising manager, (Bro. Connor's Workingmen's club held a meeting at the court house and Blind Boone gyrated and dispensed music at the opera house and gyrations have a peculiar charm for our Democratic friends in this campaign), however Mr. Merryman Sherman endeavored by his comicalities and antics to make up for the loss of other attractions, and it was to be noticed long before the overture commenced that he was practicing his great double act upon the trained steeds, Anti Foreign Immigration and Republicanism—the former sired the latter, damned by Greedy Republican Reform.

The grand opening pageant, parade of minutes of last exhibition, was received with unanimous approbation, and it is to be regretted that the absence of the heretofore mentioned principal acrobats, equestrian artists, aerial gymnasts and lightning change artists, devolved the burden of the entertainment, on that prince of jesters, "eye Journal Grimaldi." He was fully equal to the task, however, and the regular entertainment was interspersed with some of the most startling, novel and mirth provoking jokes. For instance, during one of the intermissions he eagerly offered for the plaudits of the audience a little pamphlet styled "Public office and public trust" or the clean record of an honest man? Hon. Grover Cleveland!!! This was considered such a good joke, that the audience, republicans as well as democrats, voted to send for five hundred copies, the republicans voting to a man, to spare no means that would contribute to amuse the democratic jokers until an asylum is prepared as a refuge, when the idea of November find them struggling and foot-ore seeking a place of rest for their broken hearts and blasted hopes. The audience had hardly recovered from the effect of this brilliant sally, ere their risibilities were again provoked by the suggestion to throw the large American flag, or nomenclature of the club room, to the breeze; bearing the magic names Cleveland and Hendricks so that the blind might read. Our representative is not certain as to the last condition, and if it is in-errectly reported, the public must bear with the scribe, who is of an excessive nervous temperament and whose feelings were worked upon by the excessive solicitude on the part of his friends, who informed him that the Democracy had been warned against him. The scribe has already noted the absence of the Grand Warner or Master of Ceremonies, and owing to the slim attendance of democrats in the audience, was on the alert lest the said G. W. or M. of C. with an awkward and was executing a flank movement on his position. During this era of confusion or apprehension the scribe was horrified at hearing the stars and stripes described as a Cleveland and Hendricks flag, and this ghastly joke had an appalling effect on every member of the audience. The states furnishing the majority of democratic votes occasionally flaunt the stars and bar, but they never revere the old flag as it heralds an appropriation.

A quiet humor settled on the audience and the regular programme was proceeded with, until it was proposed to order lamps and accoutrements for Cass County's or Plattsmouth's democratic club, when one member querculously piped out, 'where is the money to come from?' Courage was inspired in this weakling by the assurance that our distinguished fellow citizen John R. Cox was willing to send the order on for whatever the club needed, and Grimaldi called smiles to the lips of his heralds, once more by the assurance that the gentleman named 'was a patriot as well as a democrat, and would doubtless supply whatever the club, referred to, stood in need of without one cent of profit.

The closing scene draws night. The acting Master of Ceremonies announces as the closing act, miscellaneous business or good of the order, consisting of arguments? speeches or singing. Upon this announcement the major part of the audience arose, as if to depart, when a loud burst of vocalization sounded, Livingston! Livingston! Livingston!!! and the departing audience, as well as the HERALD scribe stood spell-bound. The acting M of C, peering into the cimmerian gloom that had now enveloped the audience, demanded if General Livingston be present, that he come to the front. All was silence. A courier breathlessly informed the questioner that the General was on the sidewalk, and the HERALD representative, fearing an ambush, inconspicuously fled. Ordinance No. 48.

AN ORDINANCE creating a Board of Health.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the city of Plattsmouth:

Section 1. That a board of health, consisting of from three (3) to five (5) resident freeholders of the city of Plattsmouth, a majority of whom shall be regular physicians in good standing is hereby created; said board of health shall be elected by the city council at its first regular meeting after the passage of this ordinance, and thereafter said board of health shall be elected annually immediately after the appointment of the standing committees in each municipal year.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the said board of health at its first meeting after the members thereof are elected by the city council, to elect one of its members chairman, and the city clerk is hereby made the clerk of said board of health, and the city marshal is hereby made its police officer. It shall be the duty of the clerk to attend all meetings of said board and keep a full and accurate record of all proceedings in a book to be provided for that purpose, and it shall be the duty of the police officer to attend all meetings of said board, and to faithfully obey the directions and order of said board in the lawful discharge of its duties.

Section 3. The chairman of said board of health shall be the health officer of the city, before whom all complaints of nuisances injurious to the health of the city shall be made by any citizen desiring to debate the same; during the recess of said board, and the health officer is hereby granted authority upon any such complaints being duly made in writing and properly sworn to be fore an officer authorized to administer oaths, and laid before him, to direct the police officer of said board to abate said nuisance within a reasonable time, and all such orders issued by the health officer during the recess of the board, shall be in writing, properly signed by him, and he shall report all such actions to the board of health at its next meeting together with all the papers pertaining to each complaint.

Section 4. The board of health provided for in this ordinance shall meet on the 2d and 4th Wednesday of each month for the transaction of such business pertaining to the health of the city as may be brought before it; but if in the opinion of the chairman of said board, or any two of its members it is deemed expedient to call a special meeting, then the purpose and object of said special meeting shall be reduced to writing and properly signed by the chairman of said board or any two of its members, and placed in the hands of its police officer, whose duty it shall be to immediately serve said notice of a special meeting upon all the members and officers of said board to meet in accordance with the provisions of said special call, and upon due service of said notice to comply with the call, and meet at the time and place specified in said notice of special meeting.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of said board of health to draw up and recommend the passage of any ordinances, which in its judgment are required for the preservation of the health of this city and submit the same to the city council for approval, and the names of all members of said board recommending the passage of such ordinances shall be affixed in their own handwriting to the recommendation accompanying the same.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the board of health to carefully examine into any alleged nuisances within the city, and for this purpose they are clothed with authority to summons parties before them for the purpose of examination, provided, however, that before any examination of parties take place the clerk shall swear said parties in the usual form before hearing their testimony, and all such testimony shall be reduced to writing.

Section 7. The board of health shall have charge of all matters pertaining to the health of the city, and relating to the sanitary condition thereof, and shall make any recommendation they deem proper for the interests of the health of the citizens thereof, to the city council, and all such recommendations shall be in writing, and signed by all the members of the board and attested by its clerk.

Section 8. In every instance when it becomes known to any member or officer of the board of health, that any legal health ordinance of this city is being violated by any person or persons within said city, it shall be the duty of such member or officer to file a proper information before the police judge of this city, whose duty it shall be to forthwith commence proceedings against such person or persons.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk to read the proceedings of said board of health to the City Council immediately after the reading and approval of the City Council proceedings.

Section 10. All fines collected by the police judge or city marshal against any persons tried for a violation of any health ordinance, shall be promptly paid over to the city treasurer, who shall keep an accurate account of the same under the title of board of health fund.

Section 11. Each member of the board of health shall receive for his services at each meeting of said board at which business is transacted, the sum of two dollars. The clerk of said board shall receive for his services the same as the members of the board, and the marshal shall receive for his services for each meeting of said board at which he is present and when business is transacted, the sum of one dollar; and said ser-

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vice shall be paid for in warrants drawn by the order of the city council upon the proper auditing of such accounts for services on said board. And all such warrants shall be drawn upon the board of health fund.

Sec. 12.—This ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

ORDINANCE NO. 50.

AN ORINANCE providing sanitary regulations and to secure the general health of the city of Plattsmouth.

Be it ordained by the mayor and councilmen of the city of Plattsmouth:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to cast or leave exposed in any street, avenue, lane, lot, water course, or any other places within the limits of this city, the carcasses of any dead animal, or any putrid or unseasoned meat, fish, vegetables, or any other substance which might become offensive, or to make up, use, keep, or permit in his or her house, shop, store, factory, work shop, outhouse, barn, stable, cellar, water closet, privy, yard, lot, or any other place within the limits of this city, any noisome or offensive liquids or any other substance, which might become annoying to the neighborhood, or injurious to the health of those citizens residing near or frequently passing by such offensive liquid or other substance; or to throw any fifth or offal, or any other liquid or solid offensive substance into any street, avenue, alley, lane, lot, water course, or any other place within the limits of this city.

Section 2. All public stables, pig pens, pig yards and cattle or stock yards with in the limits of this city shall be kept in a clean condition, and no accumulation of filth shall be permitted at, in or near the same; and all private stables, pig pens, pig yards and cattle or stock yards shall be kept in a cleanly and non-offensive condition.

Section 3. All water closets and privies are hereby required to be kept in a clean and wholesome condition and no accumulation of filth within the same shall be permitted at any time to reach a point nearer the surface than four feet. It shall be the duty of the proprietors thereof to throw a sufficient amount of some disinfecting agent, which has been approved as such by the board of health, into such privies and water closets, at least twice in each week, to-wit: on Wednesdays and Saturdays to thoroughly disinfect the same.

Section 4. The decision of the board of health on the question of cleanliness and non-offensive condition mentioned in this ordinance shall be final and binding upon all parties concerned.

Section 5. The city marshal is hereby charged with the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance, subject to the order of the board of health.

Section 6. All persons violating the provisions of some disinfecting agent, of shall upon conviction before the police judge of this city be fined not less than five (5) dollars nor more than one hundred (100) dollars; and in default of payment of the fine adjudged shall be committed to jail for such period as the police judge shall in accordance with the law, adjudge against such party or parties.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

To the Citizens of Plattsmouth:

Ordinances Nos. 48 and 50 have been published by order of His Honor, the Mayor of Plattsmouth, at the suggestion of the Board of Health, to the end that no one can plead ignorance of their existence. It is your duty to comply with the provisions of these ordinances, and whether you do or not, you can rest assured that they will be enforced. By order of the board of health twenty days notice to the citizens of Plattsmouth is hereby given to put their premises in a healthy condition. At the expiration of that time a thorough inspection will be made of the entire city, and any person found living in violation of the ordinances will be prosecuted, without regard to color or previous condition, and the board proposes that no guilty man escapes.
